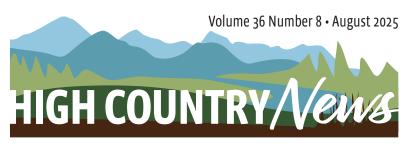

The intersection will be closed until September 15, 2025 to complete construction of a roundabout. The maps show the recommended detour routes to and from the Provincial Highways. Farm Family Award - Each year the Calgary Stampede receives nominations from municipal districts for outstanding agriculture producers from southern Alberta. On July 6, 2025, the Calgary Stampede announced this year's BMO Farm Family winners, including the Woolliams family who were among 19 recipients of the Calgary Stampede's 2025 BMO Farm Family Awards.

A fifth-generation grain and hay farming family from west of Airdrie the Woolliams Farms Ltd. is owned and operated by 5thgeneration grain and hay farmers, Larry and Kortney, along with their children, Paige and Trace. The family-run operation has roots dating back to 1890 when the Woolliams family started one of the first local dairy farms in the Rocky View County area. The farm has evolved into an impressive progressive grain farming operation, focused on precision agriculture and new technologies to maximize efficiency and improve planting practices. The family is also active in the community, with deep ties to the Airdrie 4-H Beef and Sheep Club. Their children have been members for over 10 years, winning many grand and reserved championships, and Larry has served as the club's Project Leader for seven years. Agriculture Master Plan - Rocky View County Council has approved a new Agriculture Master Plan, a strategic document that outlines a long-term vision for agriculture and land use planning in the County. The plan establishes goals for future growth, supports innovation, and provides a roadmap to support the needs and priorities of the agricultural community from 2026 – 2036. Through open houses, surveys, workshops, and one-on-one conversations, community members identified key priorities such as rural infrastructure, flexible housing options, and improved communication. These insights directly informed the plan's goals and an action, ensuring it reflects both the current realities and the longterm future of agriculture in Rocky View County. #### New Plan Quick Facts:

- Introduce a land use monitoring program for subdivision developments in key agricultural areas.
- Explore flexible housing options to support farm viability and reduce land fragmentation.
- Strengthen policies that recognize the ecological value of agricultural lands.
- Address transportation needs to support the safe and efficient movement of farm equipment.
- Balance renewable energy development with the preservation of productive farmland.
- Support diversification through agritourism and agri-business initiatives.

- Expand public education and outreach about agriculture's role and legislated programs.
- Enhance internal training to equip County staff and new Council members to better support agriculture.

**Bearspaw First Nations** - The Bearspaw First Nation is a neighbour of Rocky View County, and as such, we are working to develop intermunicipal relationships. At the Council meeting held on June 17, 2025, Council directed Administration to engage in dialogue with the Administration of Bearspaw First Nation and to provide an update by Q1 2026 regarding a proposed Relationship Committee to serve as a forum for future collaboration, including a potential Terms of Reference. This committee presents the opportunity to build relationships and provide a valuable forum for future collaboration between Rocky View County and Bearspaw First Nation. The County is aware of discussions around a development proposal from Durum Capital and the Bearspaw First Nation in the Springbank area. As with any proposed development in the County, all processes and formal discussions regarding development would be made through Council's established review and approval processes under the Municipal Government Act and other related legislation. The County remains committed to building positive relationships with our neighbours and to fulfilling our duties as an approving authority, treating all development proponents in a fair and equitable manner.

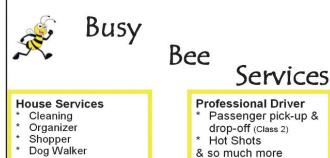

## COUNCILLOR UPDATE ROCKY VIEW COUNTY

#### **Kevin Hanson - Division 1**

Quick Bits Highway 8 bridge construction is underway. There is a lay-down / construction office space site prepared on the SW corner of Lott Creek intersection, and lots of activity with the storm water collection area between the old and new bridges. The big pile of rock fill on the north side of the highway is being "massaged" - all good news. The sooner the province gets this project completed the better.

Rocky View County MDP Work continues updating our highest-level statutory plan - the Municipal Development Plan. Multiple rounds of public engagement were completed, culminating in a Public Hearing on July 10th. Council received the public comments, questioned Administration, gave the Plan first reading, and referred the Plan back to Administration to incorporate forthcoming Council feedback.

Each Councillor has now sent in their amendments for consolidation by Administration into Amending Motions. These will be debated in early September. If the amendments are "substantive" then a new Public Hearing is needed to consider the "new" information. This may occur on September 2nd, but please check the website for the latest schedule.

Updating the plan allows us to continue to modernize it to reflect the latest higher-order legislations, and emerging trends in the economic environment and development pressures.

Prairie Economic Gateway - Land Use **Approved** The last Council meeting before the August summer break saw Council unanimously approve the Shepard Logistics Centre concept scheme and land use. This is a joint project between RVC, City of Calgary, Shepard Development Corp, and CPKC rail. As the city wrote in their letter of support "This project represents a significant step forward, not only for Calgary and Rocky View County, but for the broader regional and provincial economy. The vision for a rail-served inland port aligns with our shared goals of fostering sustainable growth, attracting investment, and creating long-term economic development."

This is a very strategic investment for Rocky View that continues to build momentum for economic development RVC, and in his case, now in partnership with the City of Calgary. However, this is also a piece of business that requires significant capital investment, and Rocky View Administration and Council has had to up its business development game significantly to ensure that the risk/reward equation does not go sideways or upside down.

FireSmart The committee met July 7th and discussed the draft Bragg Creek Wildfire Mitigation Strategy. The detailed modelling work that went into this report is astounding. It incorporates the latest research from the University of Alberta. A risk rating for every structure in the study area is mapped out in the report.

An update on the Vegetation Management Programme was also heard. The County is putting out a Request For Proposal (RFP) for the work this fall clearing out the Priority one areas as I previously reported.

New Capital Budgeting Process RVC's Capital Committee had its second meeting on July 15th. Administration laid out the path for various capital-related budget decisions Council will need to make finalizing the 2026 County Budget by the end of the year. Rocky View is at a critical point in its development as a municipality. Issues are coming into play that are the result of past growth (good and bad), continued growth, ongoing maturity, and aging out of infrastructure. On the resident

front: increased services expectations of both Hamlet and Country Residential folks, factoring demographics related to aging in place, and younger families moving in. On the economic development front: pressures for growing in multiple locations, focusing growth and making necessary infrastructure investments. On the Lifecycle Asset Management front: putting away the reserves necessary to maintain our infrastructure into the future without leaving a disaster for those future residents and businesses to deal with.

A quick outline of the scope and scale of the Capital spend/investments that Council will be considering later this fall: See tables below.

Note that Prairie Gateway investment is included under the "Strategic Initiative" column, those costs involved are significant, and in general required sooner than later. There is a wealth of detailed information found in the attachments for the July 15th Capital Committee Agenda on the website if you are interested.

### MLA UPDATE · BANFF/KANANSKIS Sarah Elmeligi

As MLA, I feel like my calendar has two seasons: in the legislature and in the constituency. Summer is the best time for me and my team to reconnect with you. You may have already met my two summer outreach interns, Cael and Lucas, who are helping with that. If you haven't already seen me or one of my staff at a community event, on your doorstep, or around town you likely will soon. Thank you for all the chats, comments, thoughts, and ideas. Each of these conversations reminds me how diverse our riding is from community to community, door to door, and event to event. The people of Banff-Kananaskis cover the political spectrum, age groups, employment sectors, demographics, and interests.

This diversity can sometimes make my job challenging. How can one person represent such diverse views and perspectives effectively? It's not easy and I try my best to

listen to you all and consider the things that bind us together.

I have always felt that our common ground stems from a love of the Banff-Kananaskis landscape and a very intentional choice to live where you live. Whether you like looking at the foothills through your kitchen window, running a cattle ranch or organic farm, spending your weekend recreating in our woods, or running a small business that serves residents and tourists alike – we all love the communities we live in and the landscape that surrounds us.

Reflecting on this diversity, it strikes me how sometimes two things can be true. We can oppose coal mining on the eastern slopes, AND welcome industrial practices on the landscape that respect our water, communities, and wildlife. We can support tourism and the economic benefits it brings AND expect that tourism to be planned and managed in a way that retains our community identity and is environmentally sustainable. We can expect the government to fund public programs adequately, like healthcare and education, AND not run a deficit budget. We can be fiscally responsible AND fund public programs so that all Albertans can thrive and have access to the things they need.

We can be proud Albertans and proud Canadians.

Two things can be true.

At the doors and at events, I'm hearing from you that you want a strong, prosperous economy for all of us to thrive. You are asking me about access to healthcare, education funding so all our kids have access to the same high quality learning opportunities, protecting our headwaters from coal mining, improving tourism management, and addressing affordability for insurance, groceries, gas, and rent. I hear you. Things are hard right now and many of you are struggling to balance it all.

I believe that we have a better chance of achieving these things when we work together with other provinces to reduce interprovincial trade barriers and promote buying local. Negotiating to get a "better deal" for Alberta doesn't start with another round of "Alberta Next" (or whatever it's called this time) panel discussions across the province. It starts with coming to the table with a willingness to work with other provinces and the federal government to make sure that Alberta's contributions are appreciated and recognized, just as all provinces would like to

#### **Boomer vs Millennial Marketing**

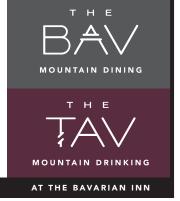

#### LOWER CROSSED SYNDROME - A COMMON MUSCLE IMBALANCE

Lower Crossed Syndrome (LCS) is a common postural muscle imbalance characterized by a specific pattern of muscle weakness and tightness around the pelvis and lower back. It is frequently seen in individuals with repetitive movement patterns, often poor postural habits and can contribute to lower back pain, hip dysfunction, and impaired movement activity.

Physiotherapists play an important role in the identification, assessment, and treatment of LCS, helping individuals restore muscle balance, improve posture, and reduce pain.

Lower crossed syndrome is named for the "crossed" pattern of muscular imbalances that typically appear in the lumbopelvic

region. This is characterized by tight hip flexors and lumbar spine muscles and weaker abdominal and gluteal muscles. The presentation is often seen in standing as a forward head posture, rounding upper back, arching of the lower back, anterior pelvic tilt and protruding abdomen.

These imbalances lead to faulty movement patterns and overuse of compensatory muscles, increasing the risk of low back pain, hip impingement, and even knee problems. While LCS may be asymptomatic in early stages, it can eventually cause:

- Chronic or intermittent lower back pain
- Hip stiffness or discomfort
- Poor posture and gait abnormalities
- Reduced functional movement capacity (e.g., squatting, walking uphill)
- Tightness or discomfort in the front of the hips

Assessment involves looking at your functional movements and testing specific muscles around the lumbopelvic and lower extremity regions. Testing muscle strength

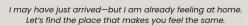
and joint range of motion helps to identify these imbalances. Treatment will often involve stretching of the tight muscles – lunges for the hip flexors, child's pose and 'knee to chest' stretches for the lumbar extensors and strengthening the weaker muscles – bridges and clamshell are a good start for the glute muscles, and focused abdominal exercises. Manual therapy, myofascial release and intramuscular needling (IMS) may help to relieve tight tissues and stubborn muscle bands. It is also important to address any postural corrections and potential ergonomic advice for work or home settings.

Some things to consider in order to prevent these muscle imbalances from settling in, would be to incorporate regular movement breaks throughout the day, maintain a balanced strength and flexibility routine, ensure proper lifting and movement techniques, and engage in exercises that promote pelvic and core stability

Lower Crossed Syndrome is a common but often overlooked contributor to lower back and hip dysfunction. Through early detection, targeted rehabilitation, and lifestyle modifications, physiotherapists can help patients restore balance, improve movement patterns, and prevent future musculoskeletal issues. #### **BRAGG CREEK TRAILS**

#### Trail Talk

The summer seems to be flying by (again!) and the BCT trail crew has been hard at work. If you've been out to Reconnect, Long Distance South or Boundary Horse trails recently, you'll notice some major improvements thanks to our dedicated crew.

#### Rain, Rain, Go Away

Summer kicked off with a bang or rather, a deluge. Starting June 20, we saw 36 straight hours of rain, totaling 130 mm. Saying it was soggy out there would be an understatement. On top of that, heavy snow and wind brought down around 30 trees across the trail network. For safety reasons, BCT issued a request for users to stay off the trails until crews could assess the damage and clear hazards.

Our online trail reports reflected the conditions in real time, and we issued a RED designation for two days following the storm, indicating a self-imposed closure due to high risk of trail damage. As conditions improved, we quickly updated individual trail designations to AMBER and then GREEN. This speedy recovery was made possible thanks to ongoing trail maintenance and drainage improvements our crew continues to invest in.

After inspecting the network, we found no major damage, just the expected erosion given the volume of rain.

At BCT, we follow a helpful 'Rule of Thumb': for every millimetre of rain, allow one hour of drying time (up to about 50 mm). Beyond that, conditions are assessed trail by trail. Of course, this system only works if everyone uses it, and unfortunately, some eager trail users head out too soon, causing ruts that require extra work to fix. These can easily turn into persistent wet spots if left unchecked.

We always encourage folks to check the BCT website (www.braggcreektrails.org), trailhead webcams, and use good old common sense before heading out after a major weather event.

#### Wildlife on Candid Camera

BCT recently launched the Bragg Creek Wildlife Monitoring Project in West Bragg Creek (WBC) Kananaskis Country to collect long-term data on wildlife abundance and movement in the area. This monitoring data will enable us to develop science-based recommendations for WBC trail management, design, and construction and public education to promote human-wildlife coexistence between local wildlife and WBC trail users. This project is contained in the approved 2024 WBC Trails Master Plan.

A total of 55 wildlife cameras will be installed in the WBC area (1 camera per sq. km.) following standard protocols and methodologies from the Bow Valley Wildlife camera program (220+ cameras) run by Alberta Parks. Each wildlife camera is located to maximize wildlife photos and minimize people photos, so typically not close to a WBC trail. Any images of people that are taken will be deleted and not saved. There will be a limited number of volunteers who are trained to handle image processing following standard protocols.

A huge thank-you goes out to the 68 volunteers supporting the project who will be deploying the cameras, swapping memory cards and batteries, processing images, and analyzing data.

We look forward to sharing some cool wildlife photos with you before too long.

#### Wildlife Sighting Data - More Than Four Years of Reporting

Shortly after Bragg Creek Wild was formed, a key initiative was established to begin collecting wildlife sighting information. This was set up to help substantiate our mission of improving human-wildlife interactions by understanding to some degree what the residents of Bragg Creek have seen.

Since the inception of this wildlife sighting initiative in January 2021, the team at Bragg Creek Wild set up a simpler way to submit observations on their website. This Google form was live in 2022 and in the current second version, over 350 observations have been added - reported largely by citizens in the greater Bragg Creek area.

In an April 1st, 2022 article in High Country News, an infographic represented what was largely observed from January through September 2021. As with any data analysis, some items fell into the "other" section. For example, an observer reported a bear sighting but was unsure if it was a grizzly or black bear. This was still valuable information! The data on the infographic was a representation of all of the data collected and was used to show species clearly identified by the observer only.

In early 2025, a Geographic Information Systems (GIS) expert was involved in a full review of the data. Working with members of the Bragg Creek Wild team, the data was scrubbed (detailed analysis of each observation) to look at various attributes and put them into 1 of 2 categories: Firstly, solid location observations with species either solidly or partially-identified (e.g. unsure of what bear species was observed) and secondly, unusable observation locations with species not clearly identified (rendering unusable data). In the end, only 6% of all data collected was deemed unusable.

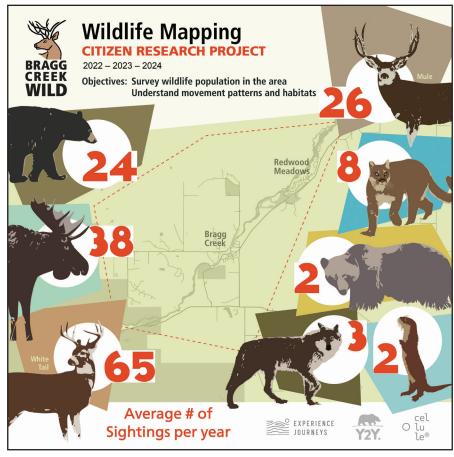
Looking at all sightings and counts observed, here is an update on what the Bragg Creek Wild team have logged:

- 2021 only data 90 sightings a total of 135 counts observed
- 2022-2024 data 341 sightings a total of 669 counts observed

Wow! Thank you to all participants for your valuable (and continued) input into this sighting initiative.

Along with the data collection and mapping, additional species were observed.





BCW received over 26 different fox observations, 2 bobcat observations, 6 observations in the otter / mink / pine marten category, 8 observations in the porcupine / raccoon / skunk category and 15 observations in the large bird category (owl, crane, heron, eagle). This reporting clearly indicates the diversity of wildlife that exists in the Greater Bragg Creek area.

As part of the early 2025 GIS data analysis, each wildlife sighting was mapped to look for trends. For example, although deer are seen everywhere, moose sightings are a different story. Exact sighting locations were mapped along with "heat maps", generated to show approximately where the observations were made - given that

these species are often on the move. The Alberta Government "Wildlife Watch Animal Carcass Records" data from 2022-2024 was also imported into the GIS to view alongside our sighting data. These types of GIS data techniques can be used to indicate accurate wildlife crossing locations for speed reduction signage placement to help reduce wildlife-vehicle collisions.

What is next? In the coming weeks, we will be sharing some of our GIS mapping heat maps on the Bragg Creek Wild website. In the meantime, we encourage you to continue using the Bragg Creek Wild sighting form at <a href="https://www.braggcreekwild.ca/wildlife-mapping">www.braggcreekwild.ca/wildlife-mapping</a> whenever you see wildlife in the area. Your input is valuable!

#### **ATV Thefts**

The number one way an ATV gets stolen is that thieves simply roll it away. Obviously, they aren't going to roll it a few kilometers down the road; they are going to roll it onto something – usually a trailer or maybe a pickup truck. There's numerous ways ATVs can be stolen; fortunately, there's numerous ways that can be prevented.

It's going to mean more time and effort for you. However, it's no different than the increasing process you need to go through to bank online. It's the way of the world these days. The world is not going to adapt to you; you are going to have to adapt to it. It's adapt or perish, or in this case, lose your ATV.

ATVs, whether a quad or side by side or something even more sophisticated, are very handy things to have around the farm or acreage. When you add their recreational value, they become even more desirable.

ATV thefts are more likely to occur prior to, or in summer, when they are more likely to be in use.

A lot of the principles that apply to vehicle theft apply to ATV theft. One difference is that a stolen ATV is less likely to be recovered. Why? Because it's unlikely an ATV is going to be driven around town or on the highway where it can be seen.

What can you do to thwart thieves? Let's start with a couple of principles that should be familiar by now: 1) if they never see it, they can't steal it, and 2) make it more difficult to steal than someone else's.

Never leave the keys in the ignition. This is a "duh' thing, but how many times have you done it?

General measures include indoor storage, GPS trackers, security cameras, installing a "boot" similar to law enforcement's parking enforcement, anything that you use to guard/protect your property (gates, dogs, etc.)

One of the easier ways to get your ATV stolen is to leave it on a trailer – thieves can hook up to the trailer and drive away. A hitch lock on your trailer is essential and it doesn't take much time to use. It is strongly recommended to use a second line of defense, like chaining the trailer to an immovable object.





"If you have to leave your ATV unsecured at camp while you are away, the easiest way to prevent someone from rolling your ATV away is to remove the valve stems from two tires so they go flat. You will want to make sure you have a convenient and fast-acting pump to fill the tires when you get back" (from ATV Man). Perhaps deflating the tires without removing the valve stems is going to make it less desirable. You can also remove a key fuse – maybe for the fuel pump – that way they can't hot wire it.

Another principle is that ATVs stored at an unattended property are more likely to be stolen - the weekend cottage or a second property. Nobody's home. Accept that reality and up your efforts to secure your asset. There was a case a few years ago where a side by side was stolen from inside a barn on an unoccupied property near the Millarville Race Track.

There are thieves and then there are the buyers of stolen goods. If someone offers you a good deal on an ATV and you buy it, you are part of the problem. Yes, you got a good deal, and you've hid it on your property, but you'll be looking over your shoulder forever. In the stock market, there is a saying, "there's monetary capital and there's emotional capital". You will forever have emotional capital (i.e. stress) with the purchase of stolen goods.

Can you insure stolen goods? I doubt it.

Is the effort of securing your asset vs the loss of the asset worth it? It's a complicated answer based on a number of factors, including loss of immediate use, the value of the asset (a 15-year-old ATV vs a new one), dealing with the insurance company, emotional trauma, the "pain-in-the-a\_\_" factor with regard to constantly implementing theft deterrence measures, etc. It's a personal decision unique to your circumstance.

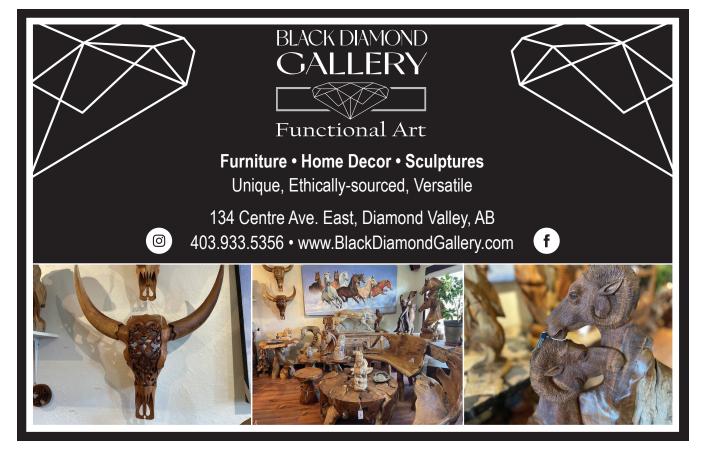

Greetings! Sharing with you...

We live in: a rural municipality, a separate local-government corporate entity, subject to the provincial department of Municipal Affairs, and laws of Alberta, Canada and our own Bylaws. Municipalities come in different forms, including counties, municipal districts, specialized municipalities, cities, towns and villages. These Hamlets are within the jurisdiction and boundaries of Foothills County: Aldersyde, Blackie, Cayley, De Winton, Hartell, Heritage Pointe, Millarville, Naptha, Priddis and Priddis Greens.

**23,000+ people:** call this beautiful rural municipality "home". Our County features the foothills, rivers and prairie of sunny, southern Alberta, with 15,380+ titled properties, covering an area of approximately 3,600 square kilometres.

The County maintains over 2,000 kilometres of road and features Provincial primary Highways 2 & 22, providing easy access to markets and an ideal location for homes, farms and businesses. We are next-door to Calgary and 13 other municipal neighbours. Foothills is also part of a collaboration of all 69 counties and municipal districts, called the Rural Municipalities of Alberta.

Foothills County: is divided into 7 electoral divisions, each represented by a Councillor. I am writing to you from Division 4. As your local councillor, it is my pleasure to assist you with matters of a municipal nature and also help refer you to other resources. **Division 4 Councillor Tasks:** I prepare for and attend weekly full-day Council meetings, have on-going interaction (work, support, meetings) with residents, community associations, businesses, school divisions, provincial & federal departments & representatives, attend conferences, and work on current issues. I participate as a member on these Boards/ Committees: Alberta Municipal Climate Leadership Council, Bow River Basin Council, Calgary Regional Airshed Zone, Cross Conservancy, Dark Sky Initiatives Stakeholders Working Group (Chairperson), Foothills Regional Emergency Services 9-1-1 Commission (Chairperson), Foothills Rural Policing Committee, Inter-Municipal Committees (Calgary, Okotoks (alt), Diamond Valley (alt)), Highwood Management Plan Public Advisory Committee, North West Foothills Recreation Board, Priddis - Red Deer Lake Recreation Board, and Rural Fire Board (Chairperson). Additional duties are required in my role as chairperson for 3 Boards.

Residents are supported by many services: administration of Foothills County, agricultural services (maintenance, brushing, weed control, education, advice), assessment department, bulk-fill water stations, building permits and safety codes, cemeteries, community clean-up support, corporate services and financial management, 7 councillors, council meetings, 9-1-1 call answer and fire dispatch, emergency management, family and community support services, fire department (+ equipment, burn permits, inspections), garbage disposal (full cost recovery, some hamlets), 2x garbage transfer stations (75% subsidized), grant funding admin, inter-municipal planning, legislative services, libraries, mapping, planning and development admin (reviewing & approving applications, permitting, coordinating public hearings), recreation and parks + facilities, regional landfill and Frank Lake management, road construction and maintenance by public

works (snow removal, grading, gravel, bridge repair, culverts, mowing, equipment, vehicles, dust control product, responses to weather surprises), shared admin building and 3 workshops, staff for all departments, Stars ambulance, tax department, traffic and bylaw enforcement services, various committees for community support, water/wastewater services (full cost recovery, some areas), social media, website, and Western Wheel subscription (minutes, hearing and development notices).

**Planning:** As we face an increase in demand for services, we must plan for the future in order to be equitable throughout our municipality, take our residents' views into consideration, mitigate impacts, consider regional efficiencies, maintain adequate service levels and carefully keep taxes reasonable. Your input has been included in our Municipal Development Plan, Growth Strategy, Inter-Municipal Plans, and recently in Secondary Suites. We continue to collaborate with different levels of government and our neighbours to achieve resolutions to problems. We're planning for and encouraging industrial/ commercial development in our Hwy 2A Industrial Corridor, looking for income to offset and reduce taxes on residential assessment. Work is under way to review our Municipal Development Plan in the coming months.

2025 Municipal Election: As noted earlier this year, I have submitted my nomination papers and am running as a candidate for the October 2025 municipal election for Foothills County Division 4. Please contact me with any questions or comments you may wish to share and discuss.

My brother owned a Cessna Skyhawk and I had the privilege of being his copilot on several occasions. I was always impressed with the preflight procedure. There was a checklist that my brother went through before every flight. The preflight protocol does not prevent unforeseeable circumstances from developing but it does establish the basic reliability of the plane.

Here is a checklist that helps establish our basic reliability in life.

- 1. How's my vision? How do I see people?
  Do I look down on them? See them as problems? Do I judge them by their education, social status, or material wealth? Or do I see them as having value and potential for a productive life? If I see them as possessing value, I will treat them with honor and respect.
- Are my expectations rooted in reality or have I created a reality that is rooted in fantasy. Fantasy doesn't have a plan for

- fulfillment. Reality has steps of action that lead me to my goal. Lying lips create a reality that is divorced from the facts.
- 3. Do I treat people as expendables? Unfortunately, for many the ladder of success is built with people that have been climbed over to reach their goal. Do you kill your opposition to succeed or are you more concerned about helping others succeed?
- 4. Are you looking for the shortcuts? Thousands of hours are wasted looking for shortcuts to take us to our "dream." We forget that sometimes the longest detours take us to exactly where we need to go. Replace the shortcut with the determination to allow our circumstances to develop our character. Remember, your value to others is determined by the problems you are able to solve.
- 5. Avoid pragmatism and expediency. Just because something works and produces results does not mean that it is right. Scams are built on the deception of promised results. Shortcuts usually require that we trespass on someone else's property.

- 6. Don't let the testimony of others replace verifiable fact. Are there third-party assessments and clinical trials that verify the claims?

# INCORPORATING by Bill Stemp

When you incorporate in Alberta, you are able to limit your liability to creditors. What this means is you will not be personally responsible for the debts of the corporation because the corporation is deemed by law to be a separate legal entity. You will only be responsible for corporate debts if you sign a personal guarantee for instance with a bank. This is very important for you to understand.

When you incorporate you must have at least one shareholder and one director. The directors of a company are the people who are responsible for the corporation's activities. The directors hire or appoint the officers who in a small corporation are usually the same people. The shareholders elect the directors annually.

The corporations that we set up have 6 classes of shares, one class of voting common shares, 4 classes of nonvoting common shares and one class of preferred shares. We do this so that you can have investors in your corporation who would not necessarily want or need to have

any say as to who the directors of the company would be but they would like to have dividends paid to them for their investment. By having different classes of nonvoting shares, you can have different dividend rates paid to these shareholders. For example, one class of nonvoting shares could have a fixed dividend rate of 4% per year while another class could have a fixed dividend rate of 6% per year.

Further, the directors can decide if the dividends are to be paid every year or only if the corporation has sufficient profit to declare a dividend. The directors also can determine the dividend rate to be paid each year. This gives the directors much more flexibility to handle the corporation's affairs.

By incorporating you are able to have a health benefit trust set up where your personal medical expenses can be reimbursed to you by the corporation without this being deemed to be taxable to you as the employee. Further, the corporation is entitled to write off these expenses from its taxable income. So you as the shareholder/employee do not pay tax on the money reimbursed to you by the corporation and the corporation is entitled to write off this cost. This can be a very big benefit to you.

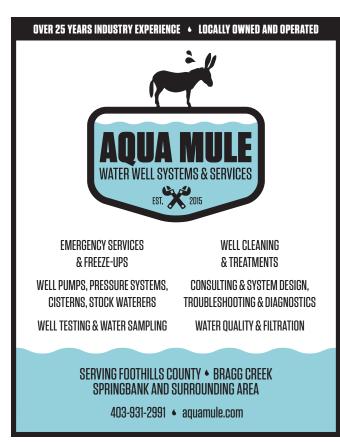
If your Corporation qualifies as what is known as a Canadian Controlled Private

Corporation, which usually applies to anyone with active business income, the applicable corporate income tax rate is 9% Federal and 2% for Alberta. However please note that for inactive business income which includes investment income i.e., interest, the rate is 38% Federal and 8% Alberta.

Thus in most cases you will be paying a total of 11% Federal and Provincial for corporate income tax which is substantially less than what you would be paying as an unincorporated business.

The cost to incorporate is \$1,200 plus GST plus disbursement costs of approximately \$475. These fees includes a name search, incorporating, minute book, share certificates and minutes/resolutions to set up the directors/shareholders.

- 1. Build in Rest Days
  Recovery isn't lazy, it's necessary.
  Schodulo 1, 2 full root days por ye
  - Schedule 1–2 full rest days per week, and consider active recovery like walking, gentle yoga, or mobility work on other days.
- 2. Listen to Your Body, Not Just Your Calendar Got a heavy leg day planned but slept poorly and feel run down? Shift things around. Your body doesn't follow a rigid schedule so give yourself permission to adjust.
- 3. Vary Your Intensity

#### Understanding Income Qualification for a Mortgage

Buying a home is one of the biggest financial commitments most Canadians will ever make, and getting approved for a mortgage is a critical step in that journey. One of the most important factors lenders consider when reviewing a mortgage application is income — not just how much you earn, but how stable and verifiable your income is.

Understanding how income qualification works can help you prepare and improve your chances of securing the mortgage you need.

#### **Types of Acceptable Income**

Lenders will examine where your income comes from and whether it's stable. Generally, the following types of income are acceptable:

 Salaried Income: If you're a full-time employee with a guaranteed paycheque, this is straightforward. Most lenders

- require recent pay stubs and a letter of employment.
- Self-Employed Income: If you run a business or work freelance, you'll need to provide two years of T1 Generals
   + Notices of Assessment and business financial statements to demonstrate stable earnings.
- Hourly, Commission or Bonus Income: Lenders will average your income over two years if you rely heavily on commission or bonuses and/or get paid hourly.
- Other Sources: Rental income from investment properties, child or spousal support payments (if consistent and legally documented), and certain government benefits can sometimes be used, though policies vary.

## The Basics: Gross Debt Service (GDS) and Total Debt Service (TDS) Ratios

Lenders use two key calculations to assess whether your income can support the mortgage you want: the Gross Debt Service (GDS) ratio and the Total Debt Service (TDS) ratio.

 GDS Ratio: This measures the percentage of your gross monthly income that goes toward housing costs, including mortgage principal and interest, property

- taxes, heating, and 50% of condo fees if applicable. Most lenders prefer a GDS of no more than 32-39%.
- TDS Ratio: This takes the calculation further by adding all other monthly debt obligations, such as car loans, credit card payments, or student loans. Lenders generally look for a TDS ratio of 40-44% or less. These ratios help lenders ensure that you won't be overstretched by your mortgage payments and other debts.

#### **Stress Test Requirement**

All Canadian mortgage applicants must also pass the mortgage "stress test." This means you have to qualify for your mortgage at either the Bank of Canada's benchmark rate or your contract rate plus 2%, whichever is higher. This ensures you could continue to afford payments if interest rates rise.

#### **Improving Your Qualification**

If you're concerned you might not meet the income requirements for the home you want, there are steps you can take:

- Reduce Existing Debt: paying down credit cards or loans lowers your TDS ratio.
- Increase Your Down Payment: a larger down payment means borrowing less.

We were not used to wearing Kangas, so we secured ours with safety pins, just to be sure. We grabbed sun hats, hid our wallets in our clothing and walked out of the guesthouse.

"Downtown Nairobi, here we come!" we giggled.

We stood and waited at the stop outside the gates to the guesthouse.

The bus soon came along and, fortunately, we found seats together. We were very quiet. We felt out of place amongst these easygoing people who were chatting and laughing as they went their accustomed ways. We returned curious stares with a sweet smile and looked out the window

The bus lurched and lunged its way through busy thoroughfares and filled rapidly in the next twenty minutes. The stops were abrupt but seasoned standing passengers expertly kept their balance, swaying in unison with the bus.

We whispered our conversation, aware that our white skin and Julia's platinum blond hair were glaringly obvious. Feeling exposed, we shrank into our seats. Even so, as more people crammed into the aisle, bodies of smiling, chatty Kenyans pressed close upon us.

We chose a likely place to get off, where the shops looked more like the ones we were used to at home, and spent a couple or three hours choosing a few gifts for family and friends.

It was getting late and time to get back to our lodgings for supper. We found a bus stop for the return trip.

A mass of workers and shoppers thronged the bus stop. We went to the back and waited our turn to board the next bus. When the bus pulled up, a surge of determined people funneled through the doorway. The bus pulled away. We were left behind in a crowd waiting for the next one which soon pulled up. Another swarm of people eager to get home pushed ahead of us.

We thought we had a place in a queue. We were wrong. The third bus came and people pushed their way to the door and disappeared inside. We were still left behind.

Then we came to our senses. There was no queue. If you wanted to go home you just pushed forward and boarded. People were content. They were used to this. It was normal.

It was the culture.

We began to panic. We were Canadians, used to lining up for our needs.

"We've got to get on the next bus," I said to Julia. "When it comes, I'll go first. Just hang onto me!"

As soon as the next bus slowed at the curb, I began to use my hands and body, just like everyone else. I shoved and pushed through the mass of humanity, Julia hung onto my Kanga (I was grateful for the safety pin) and we boarded the bus. It was standing room only. All our sweaty bodies were pressed tightly together; no need to grip the pole! Julia and I leaned into

each other in an effort to draw back from the men, one of whom especially seemed to appreciate the intimacy. A mixture of triumph, vulnerability and shame for our forwardness swirled in our minds triumphant to be on the bus, vulnerable in our proximity to strangers and shame for our 'rude' behavior.

As we approached our stop near the hostel we began to worry. How would we be able to get off? The truth was evident. There was no other way. We would have to get off the same way we got on.

And so we did! Again, we used our bodies as bulldozers and hands as shovels. At the curbside we breathed a sigh of relief, straightened our Kangas, wiped the sweat off our faces and tried to look cool, calm and collected as we joined the rest of our group for supper.

Like everyone at that bus stop in Nairobi, Julia and I had needs. Every one of us needed to get home and our needs were just as worthy as any else's. No one at the bus stop was being rude. It was the culture and we needed to adapt to it. It was important for us to love ourselves as much as we loved these Africans.

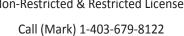

## OUT OF THE RUT Chapter 180

Watching leaves dance with raindrops, listening to the drip and fall of rain. Feeling the closeness of the sky, driving through clouds, marvelling at intensity, changability, flux and flow of weather, mood and temperature. Yesterday I sweated through a casual stroll in the woods, today it would be a sodden slog, but I abstain. Allowing for the newness of the day to unfold with remarkable clarity. Nothing is ever the same, even under the masquerade of repetition.

'Let your readers know what's coming up in September' Lowell said - opportunities to dance with the elements, to sink deeper into stillness, to rise into song.

Here's something I recently shared with my barn:

#### What About The Woo-Woo?

Some folk might wonder what the heck I'm doing when they come upon me standing around the arena with a dopey-looking horse.

Usually, I'm waiting. Breathing and waiting. Giving the horse the opportunity for its nervous system to fully process whatever just happened. What just happened could have been as simple as my picking up the lead rope, introducing a new tool into our shared space, asking the horse to move in a certain way, or someone else entering/leaving the arena.

We are very much human doings rather than human beings. For us to stop and wait, pay attention to subtle signs and appreciate the amount of stuff going on all around us, is a big challenge. The more time we spend in urban settings and plugged into electronic devices, the harder it is to let go of the urge to do something. We are driven by social pressures for constant achievement.

With horses, this often translates to the most well-meaning human partners unintentionally 'shouting' at their horse friends. If you hang out watching the herd – whether that's two horses or a whole gang, the signals and communications are constant and generally subtle. The slightest shift in weight, tail flick, ear swivel, alteration in facial expression, lip tightening etc – are all messages back and forth.

Horses described as 'stubborn', 'lazy', 'spooky', 'disrespectful' in my experience, are generally horses that do not feel heard, seen, or understood and/or they are physically suffering. They do not feel part of a conversation, more the subject of a stream of demands. Once the horse stops feeling seen or heard, they can give up trying to communicate. Often misinterpreted as a docile or well-trained horse, this learned helplessness may one day overflow in dramatic reaction something may happen that surprises and frightens them, not having learned how to deal with an unexpected occurrence, to control their own instincts, a wreck occurs.

Horse survival instinct is to not show pain, appear vulnerable to predation or separation from the herd. It's therefore easy to overlook a niggling discomfort which may become a bigger issue. Often a horse will not be lame as such, but has structural issues that prevent them moving freely and fully. Sometimes easy to help, other times not so much.

There is no guaranteed success when dealing with another sentient being, but I aim to empower the horse, to give



them body movement tools that promote physical and mental relaxation and thus a more harmonious relationship with humans. Horses can translate learned skills into their everyday lives, gaining from the relationship, learning how to live more fully in the human world. Given tools with which they can overcome deeply ingrained survival instincts to run like stink, fight like crazy, or freeze up in order to stay alive. In this approach the focus is on time to relax, soften muscles, release tension and thereby free up minds for deeper, better learning. Mistakes happen. We are on a trail of learning opportunities at every turn. Horses are forgiving.

# IT'S A BIRD, IT'S A PLANE, NO IT'S A SUPER MOTH? by Laura Griffin

Few moths make someone stop in awe or pull out a camera as often as the sphinx moths of our province. These nocturnal moths can be drawn to lights where they can be mistaken for a bat or small bird by their size. Perhaps this is where the other name, hawk moth, comes from. I had a recent encounter with a few of the Big Poplar Sphinx, the biggest in our province between 10-15 cm in length. Their fuzzy abdomens are about as thick as my little finger; the yellow fringed antennae looked like two ornamental feathers protruding above their big black eyes. Their multiple layers of brownish grey hues blend very well with the bark of trees, but if you pay close attention you might catch a glimpse of the pink and blue colours on parts of their hind wings. Many sphinx moths are pollinators who are looking for nectar, but the big poplar sphinx do not eat as adults. They are just looking for an opportunity to mate and lay their two hundred eggs.

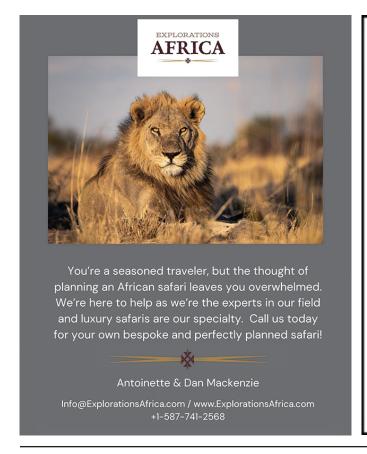
Most of the sphinx moths will be flying from July till the start of August. The eggs of the Big Poplar Sphinx are laid on poplar leaves and will become "super" big green caterpillars. August is the perfect time to keep an eye out for these immense 14-gram larvae. They are also known as horntails because they are light green with a few white embellishing stripes on their body and a harmless spike protruding from their back end. To predators, this "horned tail" looks formidable, but even with it only about a quarter of the caterpillars born survive. The best place to start your hunt is in groves of aspen or poplars like the balsams, and the cottonwoods of the prairies.

They start their caterpillar lives eating the eggshells they were born in. Their appetite for poplar leaves is insatiable for four weeks. They spend this time chewing and resting, relying on their green camouflage and obscure body shape to evade predators. They grow so much that they shed their skin several times during this period. When they have eaten enough they descend from the leaves of the poplars onto the ground, taking on a purplish hue. Here they burrow into a cell in the soil. With one final shed of their skin, they become pupae.

The Big Poplar Sphinx pupa is amazingly resilient and will stay underground all



winter until June slowly transforming through the process of metamorphosis. When this process is complete they will emerge from the pupa case, dry their immense wings, and take to the skies, once again filling our nights with a sense of wonder at how an insect living in Canada could ever grow so big. If you are fortunate enough to encounter these beautiful neighbours, please refrain from touching them, particularly on their sensitive wings to ensure their survival. However, if you are lucky, a sphinx moth may grant you the honour of landing on you.



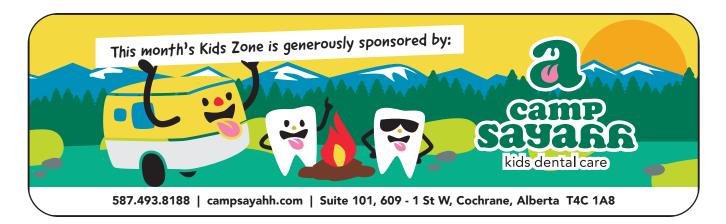

#### **PSYCHO-EDUCATIONAL ASSESSMENTS**

The most important outcome is that you walk away with a better understanding of the difficulties identified and what that means in going forward. Depending on the reason for assessment in the first

place, outcomes may include a formal report, verbal feedback, a referral letter i.e. physician, for study or workplace accommodations, application to Mensa, etc.

#### MYTH vs. FACT

Myth: ADHD is over-diagnosed and over-treated.

Fact: Despite the serious consequences, studied show that ADHD remains under-diagnosed and under-treated. Less than half of those with ADHD receive appropriate treatment.
