

# COUNCILLOR UPDATE ROCKY VIEW COUNTY

# Don Kochan - Division 2

Hi everyone, the following Division 2 information is for your use:

Development Permit Processing - There have been ongoing discussions over how Administration can provide greater access to information on development permit decisions within the County. Under the current process for approved development permit applications, the County sends an Adjacent Resident Package, including information about the proposal, a location description, and a site plan to all landowners within the circulation area defined by Council Policy C-327 (Circulation and Notification Standards). Information alerting residents and the wider public of development permit decisions is also posted on the County's website and in the Rocky View Weekly newspaper. Upon residents seeking further information on a development permit decision, Administration recognizes that it has previously been inconsistent in what information it releases, and also what process residents have had to go through to obtain this information. Moving forward, Administration will be providing a clearer process for the public to obtain documents related to development permit decisions:

 As of May 30, 2023, copies of the development permit Notice of Decision (with attached conditions) for approvals within the appeal period will be accessible online through the County website. Letters to adjacent landowners will include guidance on where to find the Notice of Decision.

- Where adjacent landowners require additional development permit approval documentation, they can now submit requests directly to the Development team, rather than being directed to submit a record request to the County.
- The Development team has been directed to provide all information which helped inform the development permit approval review process.
- Information released may include approved technical studies, operations and management plans, and other relevant supporting plans and documentation.
- In releasing the development permit application and approval details, staff will ensure that any personal or financial information is redacted.

In addition to facilitating greater access to development permit decisions, Administration is continuing to assess how it can provide better access to both planning and development applications prior to decisions being made on these files. Further review of the County's processes on disclosure of planning and development documentation will be undertaken in the coming weeks to ensure that the County is providing all the information it can to the public in alignment with Council's Strategic Objective of enhancing transparency and communication. Further updates will be provided to Council and the public on improvements to planning and development application information sharing as progress is made in this area.

**Springbank Area Structure Plan (ASP)** – Administration presented an updated ASP to the Governance committee on April 4th. Although changes have been made, questions on cluster residential, employment areas and development

expansion areas needed more clarification and community input regarding these points. Administration is finalizing the planned public engagement materials and revisions to the draft Springbank ASP document. Updates to the previous 2018 servicing study are also being undertaken to accommodate the revised land use strategy.

The next round of community engagement is planned to include the following:

- 1.An overall summary on how the plan has been updated since the last draft to take into account residents' feedback.
- 2. Updates on how the Calgary Metropolitan Region Growth Plan has affected the future planning of Springbank.
- 3. Updated information on how the ASP area is proposed to be serviced for water and wastewater.
- 4. Information on the concept of Open Space Development which is proposed to be explored in two areas of Springbank.
- 5. Details on proposals for the County to lead the detailed planning of key areas in Springbank, using a design-led Conceptual Scheme approach. These areas include lands along Range Road 33, around the Springbank Airport, and the Open Space Development areas.
- 6. Commentary on how river access might be planned for within Springbank.

Engagement is currently proposed to be undertaken through an in-person open house, focused discussions with landowners and residents within and near to the key development areas of Springbank, and online surveys. Updates to the project webpage on

the County's website (www.rockview.ca/ SpringbankASP) and email notifications will be sent out once dates have been confirmed for engagement. Administration is planning a presentation of the final draft plan to Council by October/November this year. Costco Application at Bingham Crossing– On February 7, 2023, the Development Permit for the proposed Costco warehouse within the Bingham Crossing development was conditionally approved by RVC's Development Authority. This approval was appealed by two parties and the matter has been heard at the Subdivision Development Appeal Board (SDAB). The hearing underwent two days of testimony and the hearing was closed on May 11th. A decision will be provided within 15 days of closing.



# **Key Ideas For Wealth Building Success**

I have identified two key observations that can impact your efforts to build assets and wealth over time.

The first is the way many individual investors place one-way bets on their market investments. As long as the investment is making money, all is good. But the minute the investment sinks for a couple of days or goes negative, they quickly sell.

As famed investor, Warren Buffet says, in the short term the investment markets are voting machines and in the long term they are counting machines - for your wealth. In other words, being too emotional and impatient in the short term may cost you returns and wealth-building opportunities in the long run. Buffet says the real rewards come over longer periods of time by investing in quality companies where profit growth inevitably leads to wealth growth of investors who own these companies via mutual funds or segregated funds.

The second observation is that many individual investors tend to expect that economic news is absorbed by economy and investment markets relatively quickly. These investors expect that new information is "priced" into markets almost instantly.

The challenge with this second observation is the "transmission effects" that determine the time it takes for economic changes to be felt at the household level.

During times of economic uncertainty, my advice is to stay focused on the long term as the economy absorb news or changes. The basics rules of investing remain the same and will seldom change as quickly as market conditions change.

The other chatter in financial news is about how quickly things will return to a pre-Covid "normal". There are several factors to consider when contemplating these ideas:

#1 - Rising inflation and rising interest rates are likely to affect overall economic activities for at least several more years. Governments globally are likely to create more money to meet budgetary and debt servicing needs. Since the start of the Covid crisis, the US alone issued the equivalent of about 40% of all the US government debt accumulated from 1776 to the present.

#2 - The USD is increasingly being replaced as the primary global trade settlement instrument. The recent rise of the BRICs currency regime is foreshadowing the likely continued decline of the USD as "King" of the global trade system. This new trading bloc is using other global currencies, such as the Chinese Yuan, and gold, to settle trade amongst their members.

#3 - Globalism - as an economic operating model - is increasingly being replaced by trade groups and blocs. This long-term shift will likely impact trade flows and the cost of goods for a decade or more. For example, the US is moving to "re-shore" some of their manufacturing capabilities - such as producing basic medicines and the mining of rare earth minerals - to replace Chinese facilities and supplies.

#4 - Governments are also increasingly playing a larger role in their economies. Government GDP activity (as a share of overall economic activity) is increasing just about everywhere. The Canadian federal government accounts for about 40% of economic activity, and also, for the largest proportion of new jobs created since the Covid Pandemic. In England, the number is about 54%, France about 65% and the US is closing in on 40%. This rise in Statism - and the belief that Governments can solve all of society's challenges - is leading to an increasingly centralized command and control approach by governments around the globe.

For all these above reasons, in the years ahead it will be even more important to have a carefully planned strategy for building and maintaining wealth.

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# GREEN THUMBS...AND KNEES... AND BACKS By Jennifer Gordon

You may think GARDENING couldn't possibly be "exercise". However, your body is bending, twisting, reaching and doing motions you likely haven't done in a year! Shoulder tendonitis, knee issues and lower back strains are common problems seen with the rigors of gardening. Save your back and the environment with these helpful tips:

- Warm up with a light walk around the garden to limber up and reduce the chance of a muscle strain
- Back bends place your hands on your hips with your feet shoulder width apart and gently bend backwards at the waist. Hold 2-3 seconds, repeat 5x. If standing is uncomfortable, this can be done laying on your stomach and propped up on your elbows. This gentle back extension will warm up your lumbar discs. This is also a good one to do after gardening or yard work to avoid stiffness.
- Chest stretch place hands at shoulder height on either side of a doorframe, your feet staggered. Gently lean through the doorframe feeling a comfortable stretch across your chest.
- While digging lean forward with a straight spine, bend at the hips and knees and avoid twisting your back to throw the dirt. Stand up, move

your body and turn the shovel to rid of the dirt.

- While lifting use a wide stance and bend at the hips and knees, keeping your spine long. Keep objects close to your body to avoid reaching and straining your shoulders and back.
- Use a bench or table for smaller projects and knee pads or a cushion when kneeling.

It's the prolonged positions of bending forward, reaching and kneeling that really become a problem 1-2 days later. Often you can manage in the moment, but notice stiffness and pain the next day. This can be reduced if short breaks are taken every hour or so and a few stretches are done. Stand up, roll your shoulders, circle your arms, and stretch your back. These small moves will benefit you in leaps and bounds and keep you out of trouble in the long run.

Here are a few tips to keep you safely enjoying other activities you might enjoy this summer. We see an increase of overuse injuries at this time of year from excited adventurers who jump out on the trails to bike, hike run, or go golfing. Rain or shine, it is just a treat to be rid of some snow – so I know you are eager to get out there and enjoy these few months! Whatever your activity of choice, staying hydrated, flexible, warmed up and well conditioned is paramount. Here are a few common activities we tend to see overuse injuries from and some helpful tips to keep in mind ...

When it comes to GOLFING - stretching, warming up and some light workouts will have you hitting stronger with less effort. Key areas to stretch are torso rotation, shoulder circles, hamstrings and a lunge stretch for the calves and hip flexors. Oblique abdominal sit ups and the side plank will give your back more power and stability in the downswing and follow through. Standing on one foot (try closing your eyes) will challenge your balance and joint awareness and benefit your golf swing.

While HIKING out on the trails, protect your knees and avoid slips and falls by using walking poles. Assisting your balance and keeping you standing taller will save your lower back and take stress off your knees. Stretching your calves, glutes and hip flexors after your hike will help avoid that delayed muscle soreness you typically get on Monday!

These are just a few tips to get you ready for summer. Enjoy the activities you love, set a new fitness goal or simply enjoy some fresh air. 

# The importance of Habitat Connectivity

One of the principal factors to the success of nature's timeless renewal process rests on accessing sufficient spaces safely. Habitat connectivity is considered a cornerstone of a healthy ecosystem. Without it, Wildlife, plants and, ultimately, humans cannot thrive.

The National Wildlife Federation reminds us of the importance of habitat connectivity and its opposite - habitat fragmentation: "Wildlife moves both daily and seasonally to survive. However, the habitats animals rely on continue to be fragmented by housing, roads, fences, energy facilities, and other man-made barriers. As a result, animals are struggling more and more to reach food, water, shelter, and breeding sites."

Spring is a key time for Wildlife. Mammals are on the move in search for food after a lean winter. They are looking for shelter to birth and protect their young. Migratory birds are returning, settling along waterways, into birdhouses and forested areas. Pollinators, birds, bats, butterflies, moths, flies, beetles, wasps, small mammals, and most importantly, bees begin their part in plant rejuvenation. They visit flowers to drink nectar or feed off of pollen and they transport pollen grains as they move from spot to spot providing essential food to wildlife and humans alike.

The good news is we bipeds can help our wild neighbours.

Drive mindfully, May to the end of June are the deadliest months. Fawning season modifies wildlife behaviours and increases their susceptibility to vehicle collisions. An eye on the ditch, slower speeds, and a readiness to stop immediately saves lives. Road crossings happen throughout the day with dawn and dusk bringing the greatest movement.

Fence friendly, a fence can be a barrier to wildlife migration, some are wildlife traps. The friendliest fences are highly visible, they allow wild animals to jump over or slip under the wires or rails. It is heartbreaking to witness an animal entangled in a wire fence or a baby stuck and unable to get to the adults on the other side. Wildlife Friendly Fencing by Alberta Landholder's Guide. Check out this excellent resource, you can find it on our website.

Man's best friend, can pose peril for wildlife. Dogs can cause disturbance, stress, habitat destruction, predation, disease transmission, and the spread of invasive plant species. Dogs should be under control in wildlife areas and leash areas respected, especially during breeding seasons. Training is key. A well trained dog will respond to recall commands and will not chase wildlife. Training is all part of the fun and an important piece in practicing responsible dog ownership (Note: recently there have been daily reports of dogs roaming our roads on local social media. Dog owners, let's do our bit to change this). Consider installing a dog run or an invisible fence to keep your pet home.

### Feline friends, can be both victim and

**predator.** Cats are best kept indoors for two reasons, to protect them from being hunted and to protect the wildlife they hunt. A simple action with a win-win result! Cats kill est. 350 million birds every single year in Canada.



# Trail Etiquette: The Basics

Spring is finally here! As the season's change, so do our outdoor activities, so it's always important to review trail etiquette to ensure all users have an enjoyable time out on the trails.

The trails at West Bragg Creek (WBC) are multi-use, meaning you could encounter any number of different users while exploring. So, with all those users, who has the right of way? Cyclists should yield to all other users while hikers yield to people on horseback. As with most things though, there are some situational conditions where the right of way may be altered. Although bikers should never expect hikers to yield to them, if a biker is slogging up a tough incline the considerate thing to do would be to step aside and let them continue. A general rule to follow, for both hikers and cyclists, is the uphill party has the right of way over the downhill party. If encountering equestrians on the trail remember to speak calmly when approaching, avoid abrupt movements, and step off on the downhill side of the trail, whenever possible, to let them pass. It's also common courtesy to let faster individuals/ groups pass you, if you're moving slower than they are.

The WBC trailhead and surrounding area is a Provincial Recreation Area (PRA), meaning dogs are required to be on leash. Once past the PRA boundary signs, however, you are no longer within the PRA's limits and dogs are allowed to be off-leash, provided they are kept under control, meaning they are not harassing livestock, wildlife, or other trail users. Always pick-up after your dog and ensure the bagged waste is not left on the trail and is disposed of properly.

In addition to the above, there are a few more etiquette rules to follow, most of which can be attributed to the seven principles of Leave No Trace. Remember to pack out all garbage/food scraps that you brought with you, stay on the trail instead of creating shortcuts that ultimately lead to trail braiding and soil erosion, avoid using trails in soft/muddy conditions, be prepared for rapidly changing weather conditions, emergency situations, and wildlife encounters, follow trail signage, slow down at intersections, and avoid using portable speakers as they have a tendency to annoy other users and are not effective at deterring bears. In case of an emergency, call 911 (there's a cellular hotspot located at the Trails Centre entrance) and ask for Kananaskis Emergency Services.

Lastly, be friendly. We're all out there to have fun, get some exercise, and connect with nature and you'd be surprised how far a quick 'hello' to passing groups can go!

# REDWOOD MEADOWS EMERGENCY SERVICES

Redwood Meadows Emergency Services wants to ensure you have an enjoyable and safe summer. Here are some good tips to keep in mind:

- Keep children and pets away from fireworks, stoves, grills and campfires.
- Bring a fire extinguisher or fire blanket with you on outdoor trips. This way, you can easily extinguish the fire before it grows out of hand.
- Before you use a grill, first check the connection between the propane tank and fuel line to ensure it isn't blocked or leaking. Be sure to not overfill the propane tank.
- Douse hot coals with plenty of water before disposing of them. Never put them inside plastic, paper or wooden trash bins or containers.
- If you build a campfire during a picnic or camping trip, keep it small and douse it completely with water using the "soak, stir, soak" method to put it out. Check for fire bans at albertafirebans.ca.
- Formulate escape routes for houses or cottages. Practice fire drills at least twice a year. Leave emergency numbers near the phone.
- Use barbecue grills away from the house, from the tent or anything that can catch fire.
- When checking in at a hotel, Air BNB or renting seasonal property, don't forget to check fire safety of the place. Examine if there are fire exits, fire extinguishing equipment, working smoke detectors and clear signage of the escape route.
- When using a lawnmower, never fuel it while it's still hot. Give it a few minutes to cool down.
- If outside and your clothes catch on fire, use the STOP, DROP and ROLL method. Use a fire extinguisher to put out a small fire that isn't spreading. Call 911 immediately.

# Have A Taste Of Bragg Creek's Very Own Distillery

When you think of it, the progression from pharmacology to distillery makes perfect sense. Brett Schönekess' doctorate gave him an understanding of chemistry and microbiology few distillers can claim. And so is Bragg Creek craft distillery -the result of Brett's erudition paired with a passion for quality spirits, hands on learning with fine distilleries and a keen sense of entrepreneurship.

Brett started in 2016. Phase one of the distillery consisted in contracting the distillates out of two separate facilities in British Columbia, utilizing his unique recipes and specifications. This year, Brett is completely hands-on distilling in his facility in Calgary. His new line of spirits - "The Hut" - is now available in Bragg Creek's coolest tasting room, a small log building with a mysterious past.

The "Hammill Cabin" is probably as old as Bragg Creek. The Hammill family purchased the property in 1951 and in the 1960s dug a cold cellar beneath the cabin. In doing so they found a human skull. In honour of the deceased, the Hammills thought it fitting to display the skull, they named Charlie, on the mantel complete with a top hat, sunglasses and an old port cigar. Fast forward to 2007, and in keeping with the theme, the cabin became the setting of a murder scene in the Netflix cult series Fargo (Season 1, Episode 10). How cool is that?

Today the cabin is still tucked in tall evergreen trees on Burnside Drive, across the road from the main shopping area, the small three-room log cabin boasts the original stone fireplace, has low windows, and is furnished with cozy sofas, arm chairs and a raised bar. It is a perfect place to relax and engage in a tasting of fine spirits or elevated cocktails. The cabin extends outdoors in the summer with a patio shaded by the tall trees. Brett and a team of enthusiastic bartenders engage guests in all matters of spirit making and spirit tasting. When not open to the public, the tasting room is available for rent for private gatherings. The room accommodates 10 people, and the patio 22. Food such as charcuterie boards can be ordered to complement the selection of beverages.

Tasting Bragg Creek's spirits revealed pleasant surprises and some wow factors. The Hut whiskies are delicate, smooth and balanced. The flavours hover between floral, fruity, and nutty, with hints of smoke and spices. The whiskies are single malt and aged in various old wine barrels, each imparting unique aromatics and flavours. This is why the whiskies are referenced with their barrique numbers.

The Snoday vodka is smooth and silky, while the gin is defined by its classic botanical and heavy citrus notes. Many have already received accolades and awards for their quality and distinctiveness.

Bragg Creek Distillery' spirits can be purchased on-site or ordered online. I however recommend visiting the old cabin with friends to enjoy a tasting of the products and indulge in a cocktail. This way you will become acquainted with the offering and your final selection will be satisfying.

Brett is committed to all that he does. His venture thrives in the minutia of the fine art of spirit-making. He is also committed to the community and the natural environment he and his family feel privileged to share. For this reason, Bragg Creek Distillers recently offered to share some of their sales revenues with Bragg Creek Wild, a new community-based organization committed to building a safe and sustainable environment where



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# AirTags, Smartags, Tiles

In my last article on Auto Theft, I described an occurrence where a stolen vehicle was tracked and intercepted by police with the use of a "tracker app". The article from which I took this incident did not state which tracker app was used. In this column I will introduce some relatively new tracker technology that may affect you whether you want it to or not.

The technology is that of tracking devices and their related apps. I will focus on the Apple AirTag as one example as I don't have space to describe all of them. Related products include Samsung's SmartTag, a product called Tile, as well as tracking options installed by vehicle manufacturers.

The AirTag is a small device that can be slipped into, stuck on, or otherwise paired with any object or person. It is about the size of a thick Toonie. It came out just a couple of years ago and was preceded by similar products such as SmartTag and Tile.

An AirTag is registered/tagged with your iPhone such that the AirTag then becomes a remote tracking device for you. It was intended as a way for people to track items if they were stolen or as a means to know the whereabouts of your child (by putting it in their backpack or elsewhere on their person).

Once the AirTag is paired with something, it sends out a Bluetooth signal that can be detected by other nearby Apple products. In other words, an AirTag uses the location capabilities of other Apple products (iPhones, Apple watches) to determine its location thus avoiding the installation of a pricier GPS system. The AirTag owner can then use the Find My app on their iPhone to see where the AirTag, and whatever they paired it with, is.

The AirTag does have many legitimate uses such as finding lost luggage, stolen vehicles, ATV's, lost pets, etc. However, criminals are using the AirTag (and its equivalents) for not-so-legitimate purposes.

For example, criminals can go "shopping" for a vehicle in a mall parking lot, and when they find one they like, they place an AirTag somewhere on the vehicle. Then when the vehicle is driven home by its owner the criminal can steal the vehicle while they are asleep. Apple has tried to counteract this by giving you an alert (a sound) on your iPhone (it may work on Android phones too) that you have an AirTag that is not yours, somewhere nearabout. You can then use the Find My app on your iPhone to find the location of the unwanted AirTag on your vehicle.

You can disable the AirTag once you've found it by twisting it, which opens up

the AirTag. Then you can remove the battery. The battery can last from six months to a year.

In a YouTube video by David Manning, he says the police can use AirTag's serial number to track its association with the Apple product it is connected with. Once the ID of the Apple product is known they can find the individual responsible.

Another nefarious way that an AirTag can be used is to stalk someone. A criminal will slip this into someone's purse or pocket and track them without having to physically follow them. If you get a notification on your phone that a tracking device is on you, the proper protocol in this case is to NOT go home (because then they know where you live), but to go to the nearest police station. Then, as described above, the AirTag can be tracked back to the criminal.

You should at least be aware of how AirTags can be used against you. If you are interested in learning more about the use of AirTags, there are many good YouTube videos to get you educated. Because this is relatively new technology, it is evolving as manufacturers and criminals try to counter each other's advancements.

One interesting aspect of AirTags is that if you are in a rural area, Apple products can be few and far between making tracking of an AirTag much more sporadic and unreliable. It is almost impossible if there is no cell service.



Greetings! Sharing my News Update ...

Where to find info on wildfires? Although there is lots in the news about the wildfires in Alberta, there are some helpful resources that you may or may not be aware of. You can find the tally of wildfires, whether they are in control or out of control, and find their location. For those of us living in the West Foothills area, you may be interested in checking out the BC wildfire situation, since that also has a huge bearing on air quality for us. In case you are travelling, you can check road closures and conditions. As of the writing of this article, Foothills has upscaled to a "Fire Restriction", which calls for the extinguishing of any burn permits. You can see the latest fire status on the County's website homepage.

**Community Guide to Wildfire Smoke and Health:** Foothills County and other partners collaborated with the Calgary Region Airshed Zone to produce this recently-released guide, which has been created to support communities during smoke and poor air quality events. The aim of the guide is to provide consistent Alberta-specific messaging, resources, and information to help organizations and citizens plan for and prepare for wildfire smoke events. Topics include composition of wildfire smoke, monitoring, health effects, air quality health index, communication, air quality forecasts, at home, clean air spaces and resources. RCMP & Highway 762 Update: Foothills County Council and Admin met with RCMP representatives on April 19, 2023. At this time, we were introduced to Don Racette, the new Staff Sergeant stationed at the Turner Valley RCMP Detachment. Barb and I had the opportunity to acquaint the new commanding officer with concerns about the continuing break-and-enters in the area, plus the increasing pressures and conflicts occurring on Highway 762. Since the public meetings and communications in 2022, there has been concerted effort of patrolling the highway. We look forward to the new commander continuing to make this a priority enforcement location. Since the April 2023 meeting, I have heard reports of the RCMP showing up on Hwy 762. Next, I hope to arrange a meeting with the new Staff Sergeant Racette and residents, over the summer. Will keep you posted about the meeting.

Please also note that "Mountie Moments", with stats and tips, continue to be authored by the Turner Valley (now Diamond Valley) RCMP Office and are shared through Foothills County and the High Country Rural Crime Watch via email, Facebook and websites. Also, a reminder that residents can call in situations to 9-1-1 as they are happening, or afterwards to share concerns through the 24/7 RCMP complaints line: 403.933.4262.

Foothills County – West Foothills Water Treatment Plant (WFWTP) Update: Upon review (in 2023) of the previous engineering studies and areas (near the West Foothills Water Treatment Plant, where interest in piped-water service has been identified), we share the following comments regarding a public system extension. Cost estimates remain the

same as previously calculated for the area directly north of the WFWTP, assuming there are two hook-ups per property, and all landowners are included in a local improvement project (tax). Due to the resident response regarding the price tag of approximately \$62,500, the County recognizes that there is a preference for the option of having a GRANT to reduce the cost of this public system extension. The County continues to search for grants. Once we see that there is a possibility of applying for a grant, when one becomes available, we will send a mailout to residents to determine interest and potential route(s).

2023 Community Activities Nice to See!

May was the month of many community AGMs and meetings. It was such a pleasure to be present and enjoy the company of residents while they attended to their Community Association business in person. It is encouraging to see the work being done and events being planned, which makes our area a great place to live. Events this summer range from Stampede Breakfasts to July 1 Celebrations to Summer Camps for kids to sports and social gatherings. Check out all of our great Community Associations for more news. As we take part in these summer activities being held at our local parks, community grounds and sports fields, many volunteers and County Staff will be contributing their time and efforts behind the scenes to care for these places for us all to enjoy. # Landfill and Resource and

**Recovery Centre (LLRC)** Landfill hours –Extended Hours will return again this year from May 1 to Oct 5, 2023.

Extended hours help reduce lineups at the landfill on Saturdays during our busiest months.

From May 1 – October 5, 2023, the landfill will be open Monday to Thursday 8:30 AM – 6:30 PM.

From 4:30 PM – 6:30 PM the landfill is closed to large commercial loads, so, the extended hours are only for household garbage and landscaping loads going to the Throw & Go or Bin Area. Friday and Saturday, the landfill runs normal hours of 8:30 AM – 4:30 PM during this period.

Regular hours of operation at Foothills County transfer stations:

Priddis Transfer Station SE-29- 22-3- W5M (264 St. W. & 178 Ave) Open Tuesday and Saturday from 10:00 a.m. to 4:00 p.m.

Diamond Valley Transfer Station SE-17- 20-2- W5M (168 St. W & 402 Ave) west of Black Diamond April 15 – Nov 15: Open Monday-Tuesday, Friday-Saturday from 10:00 a.m. – 4:00 p.m. During this period, branches, grass clippings, and leaves will also be accepted at the Diamond Valley Transfer Station

\*Bags can be purchased at the Priddis transfer station for \$2 per bag. Bags for use at the transfer stations are also available at Millarville General Store, Hi Ho and the Esso in Diamond Valley. Sale prices of bags at retailers is at the discretion of the retailers and may be more than \$2 per bag. Please note that these bags are only accepted at the Foothills County transfer stations in Priddis and Diamond Valley, if they are brought to the landfill, standard charges will still apply.



The De Winton Community Association (DCA) - A. Walter Turnbull Award - 2023

The A. Walter Turnbull Award was established by the De Winton Community Association (DCA) in recognition of the exceptional volunteer and community service provided by Mr. Turnbull over the many years he lived in our community. This Award is presented to individuals and couples who have made significant and ongoing volunteer contributions within the community and the DCA.

Honoree names are listed on a plaque displayed at the De Winton Hall. Calls for nominations generally go out in advance of the AGM, with the Board reviewing and voting on nominations following the AGM.

On the evening of March 23, 55 members of our community joined together for an evening of fun at our Membership Appreciation Night. The highlight of the evening was when Alan Alger, DCA President, presented Dave and Joyce Metcalfe with the A. Walter Turnbull Award. Dave and Joyce moved to the community in 1988, and right from the start, they were involved in volunteering in the area.

Since 1992, when Dave took over the "new" griddle duties from Gardy Shaw, he has been a fixture at the DCA's annual Canada Day breakfast. Every year, Dave provides the equipment, fuel and supplies to ensure that the pancake magic goes off without a hitch. Under his direction and guidance, volunteers work hard so that 400 hungry Canada Day celebrants get a belly full of pancakes and a smile on their face! Without Dave, either the pancakes wouldn't happen, or the cost to rent the equipment would put us in a large deficit.

We're not quite sure what the connection is between Dave's career as an explosive's expert and pancakes, but we understand that the original griddle, that Dave volunteered with, was a monster that leaked and burned the legs of the people using it. We can only assume that this griddle instilled a level of self-preservation and a safety-first attitude that Dave utilized throughout his career!

Joyce was a volunteer at the Preschool during the years that their son Alan attended. Joyce was also the Secretary on the Board when the Hall burnt down. After the firefighters left, she took it upon herself to rescue the water-logged records from the basement and laid them throughout their home to dry. If not for her efforts, important Hall records would have been lost forever.

Dave and Joyce have had a long history of volunteering with the DCA. They both regularly volunteered at the monthly dances and socials, as well as at casino fundraisers.

On behalf of the Board and Association, thank- you Dave and Joyce, for all you have contributed over the years to our community and to the DCA.

# DUANE HARDER Will The Real Man Stand Up!

On June 18th we celebrate Father's Day. Unfortunately for many, it is a day when painful memories of childhood abuse resurface. Years ago, in a US prison for men, the inmates were given a choice of three cards: a Mother's Day card; a Father's Day card and a blank card. 85% of the inmates choose a Mother's Day card, 10% a blank card and 5% a Father's Day card. Unfortunately, the stats were similar for women inmates. The stats seem to indicate that we have a problem with the disappearance of manhood.

Years ago T S Elliot highlighted the problem in his poem *The Hollow Men*.

We are the hollow men We are the stuffed men Leaning together Headpiece filled with straw. Alas Our dried voices when We whisper together Are quiet and meaningless As wind in dried grass Or rats' feet over broken glass In our dry cellar

Shape without form, shade without colour, Paralyzed force, gesture without motion; Those who have crossed With direct eyes, to death's other Kingdom Remember us - if at all – not as lost Violent souls, but only As the hollow men The stuffed men.

Famed anthropologist, Margaret Mead stated: "Man's role us uncertain, undefined, and perhaps unnecessary. By a great effort man has hit upon a method of compensating himself for his basic inferiority."

Gilder in his book *Naked Nomads*, says the single man in general "is disposed to criminality, drugs, and violence. He is irresponsible about his debts, alcoholic, accident prone, and venereally diseased. Unless he can marry, he is often destined to a Hobbesian life - solitary, poor, nasty, brutish, and short." If men want to come out of the shadows and have a voice that is more than a whisper, there are three idols that must be removed.

The idolization of success. Sports, entertainment, business, the arts, and a variety of other disciplines present our culture with multiple heroes. In one sense, those heroes are the idols we import into our lives. The character of the person is often over-shadowed by their achievement. While we recognize the discipline that is needed to "reach the podium" or win the championship, **it is important to realize that a person's inner life is really the measure of who they are.** 

The idolization of strength. Back in Greek mythology, Zeus placed judgment on the lessor god, Atlas and assigned him the task of holding the earth in space. This feat of strength became the inspiration for an Italian "weakling" to develop a system of body- building that would catapult him to world fame. Until his death in 1972, Charles Atlas, alias Angelo Siciliano of Italy, was the model of human strength. He was the icon of male strength. **The real strength of a man is measured in his ability to acknowledge wrong and show kindness.**  The idolization of sex. Alfred Kinsey took sexuality from under the cloak of Victorian secrecy and made it common. Hugh Hefner appeared as the male liberator. He said, "I don't want my editors marrying anyone and getting a lot of foolish notions in their heads about "togetherness" home, family and all that jazz." Writer Myron Brenton called Playboy the "Bible of the beleaguered male." Tragically we want passion without care, privilege without commitment, and pleasure without chastity.

**Real men are successful** — but that success is not measured in position, power, or possession. It is measured in our ability to make others successful.

**Real men are strong** — they are men of principle who are like a steel peg in frozen ground. They will not bend, twist, or tamper with truth to accommodate their behavior. They use their strength to protect others from damaging philosophies.

**Real men are sexual** — They know that intimacy thrives within a framework of trust and transparency and is reserved for a relationship of covenant love.

Take your place as a real man and I'll see you at the top. *Duane Harder*

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#### HAVING THE TALK

#### Adhd Diagnosis - Now What?

When a child receives an ADHD diagnosis they often take home a prescription for medication and maybe a hand-out titled "What is ADHD"? That's it. Rarely do they get a clear, fact-based explanation of what it means to them. As a result, many children, teens and parents feel confused, stigmatized and ashamed of the diagnosis.

#### How To Explain It To Your Child

Be positive in your approach. You may have to modify this general explanation of ADHD based on your child's age and cognitive ability. The part in your forehead is the 'operating system' of your brain. It's developing a few years slower than the rest of your brain. Everyone's brain has things that are easier or harder to learn. If you're playing Minecraft on a 2017 computer, it may be "glitchy" because it's an older operating system. ADHD is kind of the same thing. The operating system of your brain is playing catch-up and makes it harder for the rest of your brain to do certain things. I know you can tell time, but feeling time is different. When you're doing something you really enjoy, it might feel like you've only done it for a few minutes when you've actually been at it for half an hour. On the other hand, having to do something like take out the garbage actually only takes five minutes. For you it could feel like it could take half an hour because it's not interesting.

#### Use Your "Brain Coach"

This is a term used for self-directed talk which does not come naturally to ADHD children when compared to their typically developed peers. Your brain coach is the voice in your brain that helps you get through things that are boring or difficult; to figure out what to do next; to identify what is a little, medium or big problem; to think about someone else's thoughts before you say or do things. Have you ever yelled at your parents and realised afterwards that it was actually a small problem and then you feel bad afterwards? Your brain coach is like a YouTube video where you can see five seconds into the future. ADHD can turn its volume down.

#### Downside Of "Sugarcoating"

Be direct and help them to advocate for themselves. Most children will come to realise that ADHD is not a 'super power' or a 'gift', given the challenges it presents. A super power is not something you need or take medication in some instances for in order to manage your daily activities. However, I do acknowledge the ways that hyperfocuing and abundant creativity can be helpful.

#### How They Can Tell Their Peers

Give children the language to explain their ADHD. If not, they can turn it into negative, self-defeating comments onto themselves. The idea is to take the focus away from vour child and to focus on their behaviour within the context. For example "my brain makes it hard for me to picture what I'm supposed to be doing and to pay attention to things that I'm not interested in."

#### How To Tell Family And Friends

I often hear ADHD is just an excuse for bad parenting. This is false. Simply explain that ADHD is a neurodevelopmental condition. It means that the frontal lobe or the 'self-control' part of the brain is developing about three years behind the rest of the brain. You can't speed up the development of the frontal lobe by being stricter, or by punishing, or by telling a child to try harder. If your child had autism (which is also a Neurodevelopmental condition), would others be saying this?

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


#### **OUT OF THE RUT** Chapter 154



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#### DEAR DEER MICE by Laura Griffin

With the arrival of June and the summer all sorts of mammals seem to reveal themselves out in the woods and fields, including humans. However, the most abundant wild mammal in this area is seldom seen outdoors due to its small size and nocturnal nature. That animal is the deer mouse. You may find up to twentytwo per two acres of these adorable little neighbours. They don't mind sharing their dens with their fellows or even other mice species. The only exception is a female with a fresh litter of pups (baby mice). But even she will let the father return after a few days to help clean and raise the young. He will even take them out on father-child foraging expeditions, another reason to think of deer mice in June near father's day.

A deer mouse is most recognized by its two-tone colouration of brownish grey on top and white underneath. I like to think of it as having recently walked through a puddle of milk. The colours are where its name come from as it resembles a deer. Other distinguishing features include the big beady black eyes and big round ears. Even those in the profession of removing mice from homes can admit that the deer mouse is cute. The tail, which is also twotoned, is at least half the size of its body or longer depending on the subspecies. This tail can also be semi-prehensile, meaning it can be used to help grab branches and grass blades while the mouse balances.

Deer mice are herbivores but can also eat insects. They will forage through the fields collecting up seeds and storing them in their cheek pouches before depositing them into their caches (the equivalent

of a mouse pantry). They play a big role in moving the energy from the plants up into the food chain. Several predators rely on the abundance of deer mice to keep them heathy, from fish to squirrels to even bears. And they make up a large part of the nocturnal owl species' diet.

Now before you start welcoming the deer mouse into your house (where they often show up in the winter months) it should be noted that they can be transmitters of the Hantavirus, around 30 % are carriers. It is best to remove their access into your home and make sure you clean up any mouse dropping by wearing a mask and wetting the droppings first. If you would like to catch a glimpse of the elusive, yet abundant neighbourhood deer mice then I would suggest doing a Seton Watch around dusk. This is where you find a comfortable spot to sit quietly and wait outside in a natural area. After several minutes the wildlife will begin to think of you as part of the scenery and slowly start to go about their business. You can often be rewarded for your patience by the sight of emerging deer mice and other small creatures heading out on their nightly forages from their nests. Deer mice are quite tolerant of human observers and will usually provide a good show. Happy Seton Watching.





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
