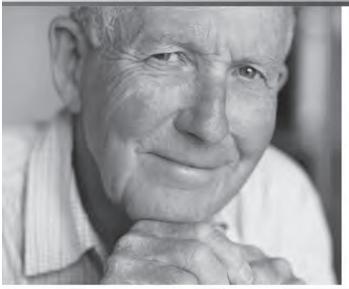

Southeast Rancher Hung Out To Dry By Government

In December, Alberta Environment and Parks (AEP) sent out letters advising Albertans that water license applications submitted over 15 years ago were being closed and water access related to those applications revoked. Southeast rancher Aaron Brower, whose ranch has been operated by his family for generations, was one of the recipients of the letters. Mr. Brower was told his application filed in 2001 by his father was being closed because the application was deemed incomplete and his traditional access to this public asset was cancelled.

To claim that a form filed with the government over 15 years ago has only now been deemed incomplete, therefore causing his file to be closed, is outrageous. Mr. Brower made several attempts to have the issue resolved with the AEP in good faith, but AEP soundly refused, forcing Mr. Brower to proceed with a time consuming and costly appeal to the Environmental Appeals Board.

Despite the ranch operating in the area for generations where traditional water usage was guaranteed, the Provincial Government is now attempting to usurp this traditional access through questionable means. It is disturbing to think that that the Government did not seek a mutually agreeable solution before taking such drastic action. Now Mr. Brower will be paying legal fees and taking time away from his ranch to challenge the decision with the Environmental Appeals Board.

A local rancher is left without critical water access for his livestock because of repeated bureaucratic bungling by this Provincial Government. Albertans know that water is essential for our ranchers, for the success of their business, and the ability to support their families. With the stroke of a bureaucrat's pen a ranch that has been in continuous operation for over a century is under threat.

Unfortunately, this appears to have become a common theme in the Milk

River Basin. Several Ranchers in the area have had their livelihoods threatened by an unreasonable and incorrect interpretation of the Water Act, or in the case of Mr. Brower, had their file arbitrarily closed without any consultation or attempt to find an equitable solution.

The Official Opposition will be raising this very serious issue in the legislature when the session resumes in March.

Albertans have always been good stewards of the environment. This is especially true in the foothills where people live side by side with nature in some of our province's most iconic landscapes. Environmental stewardship is in our DNA. We clean up after ourselves, and know that the cost of pollution isn't free. We also know that the environment and the economy go hand in hand.

To that end I'm often asked how Alberta's Climate Leadership Plan (CLP) reduces greenhouse gas (GHG) emissions and how it impacts our economy. There are several important elements to the plan that not only reduce GHG emissions, but also help create jobs, help our energy industry be more competitive, and help Albertans save money. Two of the main elements are a cap on emissions from the oil sands and energy efficiency programs.

The Climate Leadership Plan includes a 100 megatonne cap on emissions from the oil sands. It is important to distinguish between emissions and productivity. That is, productivity can continue to increase while emissions remain under the cap through efficiencies and taking the carbon out of the barrel. The Carbon Competitiveness Incentive (CCI) program is a made-in-Alberta plan designed in consultation with industry to do just that.

The CCI program provides incentives to producers to invest in innovation and technology to create jobs and reduce emissions through a \$1.4 billion innovation package, which includes \$440 million for oil sands innovation alone. The incentive package is funded by revenue generated through the carbon levy. CCIs are expected to cut emissions by 20 million tonnes by 2020, and 50 million tonnes by 2030 – about the same as total emissions from Manitoba, Nova Scotia and New Brunswick combined.

A second way that the CLP reduces GHG emissions is through residential, commercial, non-profit, municipal, Indigenous, and agricultural energy efficiency programs, which are also funded by carbon levy revenue. In the first year of these efficiency programs alone, Albertans saved an impressive \$300 million in energy costs, have received \$45 million in instant savings and rebates to purchase over ninemillion energy-efficient products, and are avoiding almost three million tonnes of GHG emissions.

Across the province more than 1,100 home improvement companies and 200 retailers have helped deliver energy efficiency products programs. Province-wide over 500 households and businesses have applied to participate in the Residential and Commercial Solar Program, and when all approved installations are complete, this will represent 16 MW of new energy - enough to power 2,700 homes for one year. Approximately 1,200 private sector jobs are expected to be created thanks to these energy efficiency programs.

Albertans know that climate change is real and we must do our part in addressing this global challenge. Effectively reducing GHG emissions through the CCI and energy efficiency programs wouldn't be possible without revenue generated by the carbon levy. The federal government has made it clear that Canadian provinces and territories must have an emission reduction plan in place by 2018 or Ottawa will impose a plan on us. Our made-in-Alberta plan is leading the country, and is designed to work for our economy. We're acting today, before the federal government acts for us, and we will continue fighting for access to new markets through pipelines like Kinder Morgan's Trans-Mountain expansion so we get the best return for our energy products.

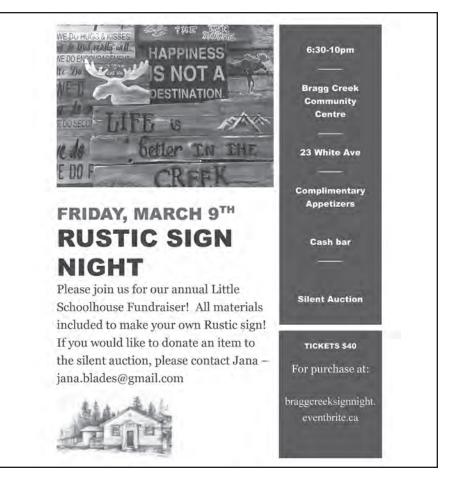

Speaking of Photography by Peter Gold

Whenever I'm on a photography assignment out of the studio, especially since we're located in Bragg Creek, I always pack duplicate equipment just in case something malfunctions, I have a backup on hand. It saves driving back to the studio to pick it up. I also want to take everything with me on a vacation.

Before we discuss camera bag options, if you are looking for the right bag solution, you should pull out everything that you plan to take with you. Divide it into different piles; equipment you definitely always need access to, like camera bodies, your favorite lenses, meters, etc.

Have another pile for specialty lenses that you might use sometimes. In this pile might also go a tripod or monopod that you might use occasionally. A third pile, especially with the advent of digital cameras, is a bag for all the chargers, cables, portable image storage unit, cleaning kit, etc. Now that you have everything broken down into different priority groups, you can look for the appropriate bags to hold it all.

For the camera equipment you definitely need by your side during your whole trip, you have a choice of backpacks of assorted sizes (some even capable of holding a sizeable laptop in a padded compartment), over-the-shoulder bags, sling bags, as well as a variety of fanny packs.

Backpacks in general hold a lot of equipment and are comfortable to carry because they spread the load over both shoulders. Great if you're planning to walk a lot. The only drawback is that whenever you need access to your equipment, you have to stop, take the case off your back, put it down somewhere flat, open it up, change your equipment, and repeat the steps in reverse. If you frequently like to change your lenses, etc., this could be really irritating after a short time.

On the positive side, backpacks do spread the load. The better ones have padded shoulder straps and also include a waist-level belt to stop the bag from shifting as you walk. Some even have small luggage wheels and a pull



handle when you have to travel through airports. All-weather styles come with pop-out nylon rain protector covers that seal your case from rain.

Shoulder bags come in a variety of sizes. Choose one that is well-padded, has Velcro adjustable partitions, and is comfortable resting on your shoulder. The all-weather feature is also available in this style as well. Make sure there is plenty of space in the case so the equipment isn't banging against each other.

Backpacks in general hold a lot of equipment and are comfortable to carry because they spread the load over both shoulders. Great if you're planning to walk a lot. The only drawback is that

A Utility bag can hold all the cables, chargers, cleaners, etc that you need to keep your equipment running properly but not stuff that you really need to be carrying around with you all day. This bag could be an older camera bag or even a large Ziploc freezer bag. Actually, keeping an extra large freezer bag is also useful to keep in your main bag in case your equipment needs quick protection from the weather.

If you're planning to be in conditions hazardous to equipment, like in a kayak or in monsoon rains, a Pelican case might be advisable to keep all your sensitive equipment dry when you're travelling. They come with foam inserts or Velcro-adjustable partitions. It's a hard case that is well-sealed from the elements once it's closed. The case will even float if tossed into a river. Might be the perfect case to travel with on an airplane as well. You can change over to the soft case when you're on the ground.

Remember to try on the bags to make sure they are comfortable. Try all your equipment in the bag to make sure that everything will fit efficiently. There is no point in a bag that requires you to remove half the contents to get at a piece of equipment.

The cases that I do not hesitate to recommend are made by Think Tank, Peak Design, Lowepro and Tamrac.

My personal preference is using a Think Tank Airport Roller Derby to transport all my gear to the final destination. It's airlines carry-on approved. That way I know I have everything I could possibly need with me. I also like this bag because it has adjustable Velcro partitions. When each space is sized for a particular piece of equipment, it's easy to see what's missing before you leave for your trip home. Then I bring the super light Peak Design Everyday Sling 10L, a small day sling bag (empty) in my luggage too. When I arrive, I chose the equipment I want to use that day and load up as needed. The rest stays in the hotel room. This system works for me.

What Is A **Baker's Cyst?**

Baker's cyst, also known as a popliteal Acyst, was originally named after the surgeon who first described it, William Morrant Baker (1838-1896). It is not a "true" cyst, which is described as a closed capsule of air, fluid or other material. A Baker's cyst is a bulging or swelling at the back of the knee. An excessive build up of synovial fluid, that is normally lubricating our knee joint, gets pushed into the cavity at the back of the knee. This may be in response to osteoarthritis in the knee, a meniscal injury, cartilage damage, rheumatoid arthritis or any knee condition that causes joint inflammation.

The knee joint is comprised of the femur (thigh bone) and the tibia (long shin bone). Between these bones are two round discs of cartilage, called the meniscus, that act as a shock absorber during weight bearing activities. Wrapping around the whole joint is a strong connective tissue, called the capsule, that surrounds the joint complex. Behind the knee, lie a few small fluid filled sacs called bursa. These bursa, which surround all our joints in the body, are designed to reduce friction between adjacent bony structures or soft tissue layers.

We may have damage to the knee from repetitive or prolonged activities, excessive weight bearing or twisting motions, degenerative changes or a traumatic event such as a fall. Swelling may accumulate and get pushed into the bursa at the back of the

knee (the popliteal space), which becomes a Baker's cyst.

Symptoms may include tightness or stiffness behind the knee, pressure or pain with knee flexion, calf pain, or increased swelling and discomfort with standing. Sometimes the pocket of fluid behind the knee can break and drain into the lower leg. This may cause swelling and redness in the calf. It is important to differentiate this condition from a deep vein thrombosis. If you have insidious onset pain in the calf, redness, tightness, pain with walking but relief with rest - you must seek immediate medical attention as this could be the symptoms of a blood clot in your lower leg. Especially if these latter symptoms have arisen after a recent traveling experience, please seek attention immediately!

A Baker's cyst typically feels like a firm bulge at the back of the knee. As the condition worsens, you may experience pain or pressure with bending or straightening the knee. These symptoms may also be associated with clicking, grinding, locking, limping, sharp pains or pain with certain activities (kneeling, twisting, squatting). A thorough subjective and objective examination by a physiotherapist is helpful to diagnose a Baker's cyst and the underlying cause of the condition. This is the key phrase here - the underlying cause! Often a Baker's cyst is secondary to an underlying injury, imbalance or condition in the knee. Other investigations such as an ultrasound, X-ray, MRI or CT scan are used to confirm a diagnosis.

Treatment primarily involves treating the underlying cause of the condition. Some Baker's cysts require no treatment and cause little or no symptoms. Generally, the initial phase is to follow the RICE regimen (rest, ice, compression and elevate) in the first 48-72 hours. Anti-inflammatory medication may also help to hasten healing and recovery by reducing the pain and swelling. One should perform pain free range of motion at the knee and strengthening exercises to help facilitate joint lubrication and muscle flexibility. Targeting the quadriceps, hamstrings, gluteals and calf muscles will help to improve the control the knee joint with weight bearing activities. A treating physiotherapist can advise which exercises are most appropriate and when they should be commenced. We may also integrate soft tissue release, joint mobilization, dry needling techniques, acupuncture, taping / bracing, and education on biomechanical corrections and muscle imbalances in the body.

Patients that are not responsive to appropriate physiotherapy treatment may seek other options such as a cortisone injection, aspiration of the fluid filled sac, or in rare cases, surgery.

If any of this information sounds familiar to you and you think you may have a Baker's cyst, we would love to help you and get you back to feeling your best and enjoying your favorite activities!

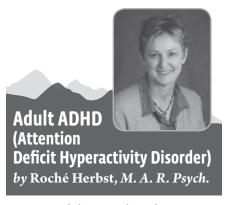

Many adults struggle with symptoms such as sustained attention, distractibility, focus, forgetfulness, organization, restlessness or impulsivity since childhood, but may not have considered the possibility of ADHD.

What Are The Symptoms Or Signs?

Most problems occur with time management, planning, organizing and the ability to complete tasks and goals. Always being late, missing deadlines, procrastination, little concept of time, etc.

It appears people with ADHD/ADD underestimate time. They tend to postpone things and wait until the last minute to deal with it. The truth is that the executive functioning area of the brain which is responsible for decision making, planning and time management, fails to work effectively. The person has an inability to accomplish all of the things they intended to do. ADHD/ADD can be seen as a performance disorder. It is not a knowledge disorder. You know what to do, but not always how to get it done.

Adult ADHD/ADD Coping Skills And Strategies

The easiest thing to do is to whip up a list of time management strategies. Unfortunately, the reality is most of it will not be used. Why not? Well, the piece of paper with the list on will probably be lost on the way home or to work, or blow under the front seat of the car, or you will forget it is there. If you do remember, you might tape it on to your refrigerator door but won't look at it. If you do look

at it, you will be telling yourself that you should really do something about it.

For any strategy to work, it must relate to something real and important in the person's life. The key to getting something done, lies between the emotions and the consequences. ADHD/ADD is an internal, neurogenetic executive failure. Nothing gets done because the person cannot self-motivate and plan like others do. A very useful strategy is to change your immediate environment i.e. cut out distractions and put a big visible timer where you can't miss it. Tackle the smallest task first. Create positive or negative little consequences as motivators so as to be more productive and effective. Note how it makes you feel as you go along.

Myth Vs. Fact

Myth: ADHD is over-diagnosed and over-treated.

Fact: Despite the serious consequences, studies show ADHD remains underdiagnosed and under-treated. Less than half of those with ADHD receive appropriate treatment.

Millennial Money Mistakes

Radon: Is It In Your Home?

What is Radon?

Radon is a radioactive gas that occurs naturally when the uranium in soil and rocks breakdown. It is invisible, odourless and tasteless. When radon is released from the ground into the outdoor air, it is diluted and is not a concern. However, in enclosed spaces like homes, it can sometimes accumulate to high levels, which can be a risk to the health of you and your family.

Radon gas breaks down or decays to form radioactive elements that can be inhaled into the lungs. In the lungs, decay continues, creating radioactive particles that release small bursts of energy. This energy is absorbed by nearby lung tissue, damaging the lung cells. When cells are damaged, they have the potential to result in cancer when they reproduce.

Exposure to high levels of radon in indoor air results in an increased risk of developing lung cancer.

Radon exposure is the number two cause of lung cancer, after smoking. 16% of lung cancers are estimated to be from radon exposure, resulting more than 3200 deaths in Canada each year.

All homes have some level of radon. The question is how much, and the only way to know is to test. Radon in homes can vary significantly over time so you need to do a long term test, for at least 3 months, ideally during the colder months.

With Spring around the corner, Townsite is reminding residents to ensure that home flooding mitigation is on people's radar. Ensure your sump pumps are operational, and that you have a 48 hr. livable emergency kit ready. The townsite is confident that the work in the community after the devastating flood of 2013 will be of great value. The work included raising and repairing the berm to a 1 in 500 yr. flood level, installing a new lift station at the north end of town to alleviate ground water concerns, and the purchase of over 2km of emergency/temporary flood berm materials. There is also an emergency fan out system that has been tested and is ready to be operational if needed.

The Townsite is pleased to announce the annual Easter Egg hunt and Pancake Breakfast will occur on March 31st from 10:30 am-12 noon at Redwood House.

A big thank you to the Bragg Creek Community Association, the Redwood Meadows Community Association, and the Bragg Creek Community Church for their help in putting this event on.

With the abundance of snowfall this year in and around the community we are reminded that we live in a natural setting. Local wildlife is finding it

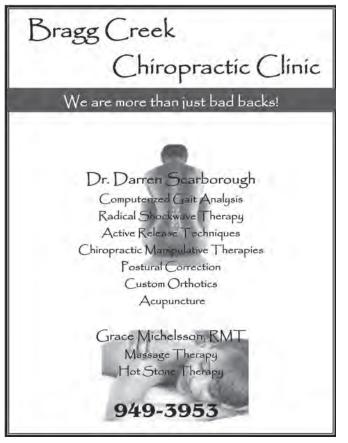

Fortunately there are now screening tests for this common cancer and these tests have significantly contributed to early detection and decrease in the number of people dying from this cancer.

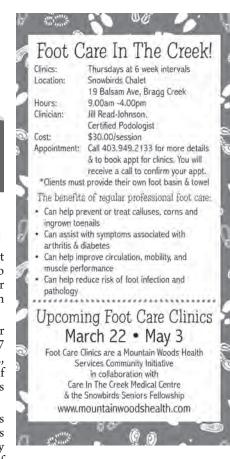

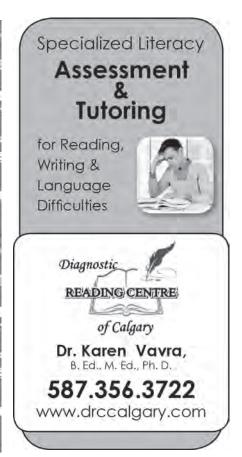

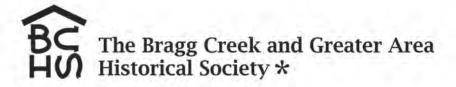

Updates from Division One

Hello everyone and thank you for tuning in. I want to congratulate the new board members of the Bragg Creek Chamber of Commerce: Lowell Harder (President), Neil MacLaine (Vice President), Gordon McDonald (Treasurer), Kathleen LaPlante (Secretary). Thanks to all for your energy and dedication to our community.

Speaking of which, we are in the midst of creating a couple of committees to get a jump start on several key issues that affect our community. First is the FireSmart Committee, being initiated by Randy Smith, Fire Chief and Director of Emergency Management/Fire Services for Rocky View County. This committee is being formed to guide the community planning process and to provide advice on issues related to wildfire threat and community protection.

Given the wave of criminal activity that has been occurring in our division, a rural crime watch committee is being formed with the assistance of the Cochrane Foothills Protective Agency who works with the RCMP. This is in its early conception so please stay tuned for future FB posts for more information. In the meantime, if you see anything out of the ordinary, call the RCMP. One key strategy of crime prevention is to report suspicious activity and to also know your neighbours and your neighbourhood.

In addition, several local organizations have come together to research and find ways to deal with our lack of internet/cellular infrastructure. I have spoken with fellow councillors and Telus, so hopefully we will be able to find solutions to what should be a necessity given where we live and the amount of visitors we receive daily. Safety is our number one concern.

If you are interested in any of the above initiatives, please connect with me and I will provide contact information.

In other news..

Flood Mitigation: Not much has transpired since my last report. Negotiations with property owners continue. The Don't Damn Springbank group are conducting their own engineering studies and will meet with Rocky View County engineers (AMEC) in the near future to compare notes. Also, Alberta Environment is working to complete technical studies of their own. Rocky View County is aware that with the snow we've experienced this winter we need to get moving on this soon. As it stands now, the earliest we can see any signs of construction would be early fall. The plans and timelines will be updated shortly on the RVC website.

SR1: An Environmental Impact Assessment (EIA) is being resubmitted by Alberta Transportation that will go to the Canadian Environmental Assessment Agency (CEAA) because they were not satisfied with the last submission. Discussions continue.

Finally, the Reeve and I had a productive meeting with the senior management team from Resorts of the Canadian Rockies and RVC Planning to keep the conversation going in terms of a possible development in Wintergreen. Furthermore, the Bragg Creek Brewery is still on the table so keep an ear to the ground for further details.

We need "sensible" development in our division in order to help with our water/ wastewater infrastructure, more density to help our businesses/services grow and more neighbours to help keep eyes on each other. Until next month stay warm.

Municipal District of Foothills No. 31 To Become "Foothills County":

(excerpt from news release by Leslie Lambert): The name Municipal District of Foothills No. 31 is changing to "Foothills County". Council passed a resolution to submit an application to the Province to change the name on February 7, 2018. The title of "county" is recognized nationally and internationally. Foothills County is a name that distinguishes what the municipality represents. name is easy to find, remember and say. This is a benefit to the municipality as we continue to encourage industrial and commercial growth - provincially, nationally and worldwide. Renaming to Foothills County brings the municipality into alignment with the majority of other rural municipalities in Alberta that are recognized as counties. It does not affect

existing policies and agreements. Costs associated with changing the name will be minimal. The name within the logo is what is changing; the logo and brand remain the same. Existing gateway signage on the

main highways is old and plans to replace the signage are in place, making this an opportune time. Evaluating 70 km/hr Speed Limit On Highway 22X:

On January 23, 2018, in response to numerous resident inquiries, I approached the SW Calgary Ring Road Construction Team about changing the speed limit back to 90 km/hr when no construction is going on. My request was shared, but they wanted more people to speak up if this was really the desire of more than a few people, in order to evaluate it further. So, I posed the question on my Facebook page and received an overwhelming response of people on the topic. The post reached 17,095 people, was shared 165 times, had 253 reactions, plus many emails and phone calls went out. First of all, thank you to everyone who expressed your perspectives and communicated to the SWCRR Public Engagement Team on this matter! inquiries and comments, to Alberta Transportation has evaluated the conditions of Hwy 22X and the speed limit, and prepared the following statement as of Friday, Feb. 9, 2018 - AT: "An investigation was conducted (Feb. 1) on Hwy 22X within the SWCRR project limits to determine whether or not it would be feasible to increase the speed limit along the corridor. The project limits of the SWCRR on Hwy 22X is east of Macleod Trail for the east end and 69th Street SW for the west end. This stretch of highway is a construction zone in which the SWCRR Contractor had implemented a posted 70km/h due to the activities taking place and the changed conditions of the highway. It was noted that from 37th Street SW to 69th Street SW there are no visible construction activities taking place. This stretch of highway was further reviewed to determine if it was feasible to increase the posted speed limit. In the East Bound direction, there is an existing 70km/h school zone that had been implemented prior to the start of the SWCRR project in order to provide a safer access to the educational institutions at 53rd Street SW. Looking at the West Bound direction it was found that the clear zone available would only accommodate a 70km/h posted speed limit. As such the posted speed limit on Hwy 22X in the EB and WB direction will remain at 70km/h throughout the project limits to reduce the safety risks to the travelling public." SO: Again, thanks for making the effort to request the evaluation! And watch out for enforcement, as that appears to be the only action that will be taken...

CRIME MATCH

It's been a quiet month in the High Country, our paradisiacal home out here on the edge of the prairie somewhere west of Calgary. Each year in March, the H.C.R.C.W.A. holds its A.G.M., and this year the meeting will take place on Thursday, March 8, 2018, at 7:00 p.m. in the Priddis Community Hall. Guests Presenters include the R.C.M.P. (with a crime update), Foothills Search & Rescue, and the Safe Communities Alert Network. You are invited to attend, and refreshments will be served.

Our local R.C.M.P. continues its Sisyphean task to thwart local criminal activity. Last month the Western Wheel noted that in less than twenty-four hours after a mailbox theft, the Turner Valley R.C.M.P. caught the thieves and have laid 102 charges against Randy Boehner (of Calgary) and Tamara Villneff (of High River), seen throwing mail out of a car

window. The police subsequently found stolen letters in their car, now returned to the intended recipients.

As we inexorably move nearer to tax time, phone scams increase in number and in sophistication. They would like to get your coordinates so they can get your tax refunds, before you have filed your own returns. A basic, general rule to follow is never give any personal information or money to unsolicited phone calls. Instead, when you need to give information or money to a legitimate enterprise or charity, initiate the call yourself, and be sure you have the correct number, not a number that the caller may have given you.

Some scammers try to trick you into saying "Yes" so that they can record your voice and use it to "prove" you had ordered some unwanted item or subscription. They say something like

"This is xxx. Can you hear me?" If you answer "Yes," they have caught you. Personally, if a caller (i.e., robot) asks me whether I can hear him clearly, I just say "No!" and hang up.

A new trick I have recently experienced twice purportedly from two respected charities is a computer that pretends it is a person phoning. It starts with a message like "I'm so happy a real human answered. So many of my calls today have been to answering machines." It pauses to let you answer, and then it goes into its pitch, a minute or so to explain why you should buy something or contribute to some charity.

It is easy to find out whether this is a robot or a person: just say something while it is making its pitch. If it ignores your words and continues to talk, just hang up. There is no human on the other end of the line, so you are not being impolite. The human is supposed to come on only after the robot has finished its spiel. I subsequently contacted one of those 'charities' and they assured me that that robot call did not come from them. One presumes the other call equally did not originate from a valid charity. They would prefer their

victims send their contribution to a site not connected with any charity.

Some good news: On February 15, the Alberta R.C.M.P. and the Alberta Rural Crime Watch Association signed an official partnership, a Memorandum of Understanding that outlines the role each organization will play to keep our communities safe. Rural Crime Watch is a community-led program with volunteers who assist the R.C.M.P. gather relevant, actionable intelligence and educate neighbours on how to secure their property and be aware of potential threats. This collaborative approach includes citizens, health, and mental health service providers, law enforcement, and government to help keep our communities more resilient to breaking the cycle of criminal activity. We are pleased to be a part of this provincial organization and hope the partnership brings more awareness and support to our organization and other local Rural Crime Watches. We look forward to building relationships to help fight crime.

If you are not already a member of our High Country Rural Crime Watch Association, you should join our group. Thanks to the work of a few volunteers and a grant from Legacy Oil, membership is free. Your obligations are nil, and you will get mail or phone call fan-out messages describing recent and current criminal activity in our area. New members also get a free High Country Rural Crime Watch Association sign. The information we publish regularly in this column is but a small fraction of the news circulated more frequently to our membership about crime in this area. And who better to invite to such an evening than an organization celebrating its sesquicentennial, the Royal Astronomical Society of Canada (RASC)? The origins of this organization was a modest group of eight men from Toronto, who despite push back from other scientific societies of the time, decided that yes, astronomy deserved its own separate society. As such, in 1868 the "Toronto Astronomical Club", which later became known as RASC, was formed. And in case you were ever curious on how they received the word "Royal" added to their name, apparently all you must do is have enough guts to ask King Edward VII for the regal designation.

Please join Steve Donaldson and his enthusiastic volunteer astronomers from the RASC for an evening dedicated to the real stars of the galaxy. Steve will guide us through what is in our current night skies from deep sky objects, the moon and everything in between. The Boot

As I laced up my boots, I was thinking of the last time I conquered this strenuous trail. For the next 4 to 5 days we would be trekking a total of 75 kilometres up and down ladders, across the ocean floor and through some of the toughest and unforgiving terrain in Western Canada.

As the sun was coming up, we could see the ferry making its way across the cove to come and take us to the trailhead. I was proud of my parents for joining us on this adventure and was looking forward to spending some quality time with them.

As we loaded our packs onto the boat, we said goodbye to civilization and hello to the unbridled wilderness. The first day was definitely the hardest. The steep terrain, muddy bogs and thick bush...I am sure I was not the only one thinking, "What have we got ourselves into?"

Throughout the next couple of days, our bodies adapted to the weight of our packs and our legs seemed to get stronger with each step. We all enjoyed the beautiful scenery. We viewed humpback whales breaking through the waves, bald eagles soaring high above and at one point, we came across a baby seal as it was soaking in some sun on the hard packed beach.

By the third day we were half way through our journey. To mark this milestone, we decided to stop early so that we could have a nice fire on the beach and dry out some of our drenched belongings. The rain had been sporadic, but the streams running into the ocean had sometimes been hard to pass without getting our footwear completely wet.

As I undid my shoelaces and pulled off my boots, the water poured out from within. "Wow!", I thought to myself "How could this have been comfortable?" There seemed to be enough water to make a big pot of spaghetti! I pulled off the rest of my wet garments and started to hang them close to the already well lit fire. Ilocated a nice 'drying' rock and carefully placed my footwear so that they too would be dry by morning.

That night we had Beef Stroganoff. It was dehydrated and just required a little hot water to make a decent gourmet meal. We scoffed it down, had a couple sips of whiskey and watched the sun set. We were exhausted. As soon as my head hit the pillow I was out like a light.

The next morning, we awoke to a beautiful day. We had a quick breakfast of granola bars and dried fruit, then proceeded to tear down our camp. The tent was starting to get easter to stuff into our packs and our clothes were perfectly dry.

As I sat down to put on my footwear. I noticed my right boot seemed a bit disfigured. I attempted to jam my foot into it, but was unsuccessful. I examined it closely and determined the fire had melted my boot. It was totally ruined. The hard plastic shell had completely caved in on

itself, making it almost impossible to get my foot into it. I attempted to cut it, fix it and I even tried to melt it back. But to no avail, the boot was ruined.

I was lost for words. What was I to do? We had 35 kilometres left to hike and my pack was still quite heavy. We were just over half a day's walk to a checkpoint, where we would have to wait and see if I could get rescued by a boat or helicopter. Both options seemed expensive and disappointing. I wanted to finish the hike.

I decided I would have to toughen up. I pulled off my socks, threw the pack over my shoulders and started to head into the forest trailing behind my worried parents and wife. I lasted 100 meters. My soft Canadian feet were no match for this terrain and the pain was excruciating. I stopped and resorted to my camp booties, which are light weight miniature sleeping bags for my feet. I would have started with them, but wanted to see if I could do it without. They provided some comfort, but I was worried I would not be able to make it to the checkpoint.

After about 30 minutes I had to stop and take a break. My feet were sore and the lack of support was starting to affect my back. By this point we were all concerned. What was I to do. I was slowing down our group and my body was getting worse. After a few sips of water and a break from being on my feet. We started to march again. The trail was narrow with dense bush on both sides, we were hiking over dangerously exposed rocks and roots.

As we came over the next hill, I didn't notice it, but my wife did. There was something buried in the trail. It looked like a old piece of leathery bark sticking out of the ground. I thought it was just a piece of trash, but my wife insisted we stop and dig it out. It took several minutes, as it had probably been buried there for decades. As we exposed more of this hidden treasure, we realized it was a boot.

My heart leapt! "Was this a dream?!" I shook my head, "It couldn't be.." We cleaned and inspected it. It was a right footed boot. I tried it on and it fit. None of us could believe it. This was a miracle. The boot was more comfortable than the one I had on the previous morning. It must have been over 50 years old.

We made it to the checkpoint and I looked over the boot closely. I believed this boot would carry me the rest of the way. I decided to finish the hike. Two and a half days later, we made it to the end of the trail. My foot felt great and as I pulled off the boot for the last time, it seemed to fall apart in my hands. I kept the remains off the boot as a constant reminder that sometimes even your smallest dream can become an unexpected reality.'

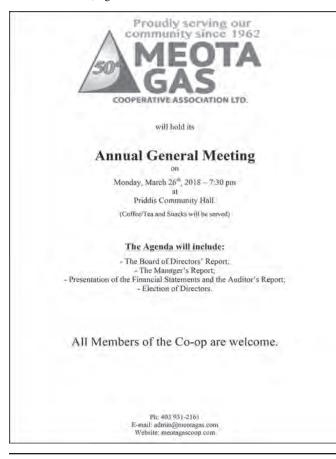

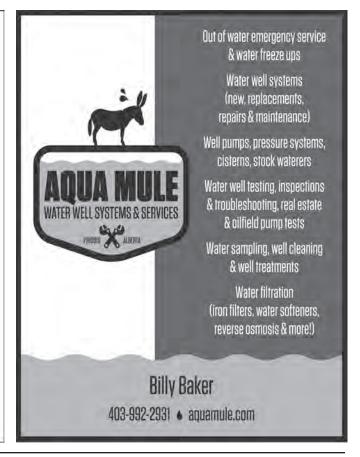

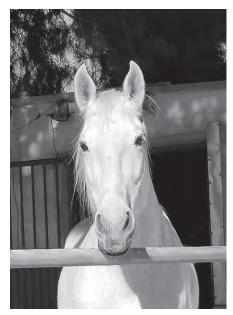
The month of my birth. I kinda like this month. Traditionally the time when snowdrops are pushing through a shallow carpet of snow, then bluebells and daffodils... oh, no, that was a previous life across the pond. Here, we are surrounded by extraordinary snow – as I drove through the Creek to the office this morning I reflected on how high the piles are along the road & around the parking lots. This is written as we ramp up for the rather impressive snowfall forecast to begin tonight and continue through tomorrow.

Wherever I am, the vicissitudes of nature's power never cease to amaze and astound. I love it.

When we work in offices, it's easy to miss out on all this. When I was in Calgary every day, the passing of the seasons often passed me by, especially the advent of Spring in southern Alberta. We are discovering things we never knew, even after decades of working with and caring for horses of many kinds, a constant learning curve that keeps us energized. There is more healing in a horse than most bottles of pills I think!

While I'm here through this month – or at least half of it – I'm offering combined sessions of Thai Massage and Qi Gong/Yoga at Cores And Effect Pilates (weekends only), I'm also really looking forward to Amy's "Pilates for Equestrian" workshop on the 17th as I know she will have some fascinating stuff to share and some very pertinent insights for anyone who wants to sit a horse with greater flexibility, grace, compassion and effectiveness.

Revelling in the pleasures of southern Alberta. Oh, and did I mention... we're taking a group to Peru in April? There should be some exciting South American news coming your way if we manage to achieve all the things we're planning!

The wind was fresh in my face. My hair was flowing behind me. Coasting down Poverest Hill, I felt strong, confident, in control. I could trust my sturdy, bright red, Triang scooter. The strong, steel footplate was tough enough to bear the weight of ten eight-year-olds; the high handlebars with grooved, rubber grips felt firm in my fists; the wheels spun freely and the front one turned obediently as I steered. Approaching the intersection with Austin Road, I pressed increasingly more firmly with my heel on the brake, and the ridged, rubber tyres gripped the pavement, pulling my scooter to a smooth halt. Look right. Look left. Look right again. All clear. I coasted happily down the last, long stretch to the bottom of the hill where Marion Crescent joins Poverest Road.

It is good to feel that same confidence and strength again half a century later. I am coasting downhill, the wind of the Spirit of God in my face, knowing that He who formed me in my mother's womb is strong enough to carry me through my remaining years, steer me

along my life's unknown way, and help me to know when to apply the brakes.

There was a tricky place at the bottom of Poverest hill. After crossing Marion Crescent, steep, concrete descended to the shops. The back wheel of my scooter used to flip forward and hit my ankle bone; but I learnt to be prepared and counteract.

Today, too, I am alert and prepared. I can see a problem ahead. Some

manoeuvring tricky is needed. But, I have thought it through, and I have made my decision. Some will like it, some will not, and some will not care. I will follow through and be prepared for any backlash.

The floor of the butcher's shop along Marion Crescent was strewn with sawdust. Mr. Cameron wore a linen apron smeared with blood, but I didn't go in there that day.

I went into the newsagent's; I bought a purple, threepenny stamp, printed with Queen Elizabeth's head. I licked it, stuck it on the top right-hand corner of the envelope, nice and straight, and dropped my letter through the slot. Further down, I stood my scooter against the window of Sanders Bakery, went inside and asked for a white, sliced loaf of bread and three Swiss buns, cream-filled with white icing

on the top. At Greggs, the Grocers, I asked for a pound of self-raising flour, a quarter of a pound of PG Tips and tinned peaches. I put all the shopping in the string bag Mum had given me and slung it on the handlebar of my sturdy scooter. Now weighted down, it resisted my efforts to mount the steep, concrete steps. Pushing and puffing up Poverest Hill, noticing now each house, the Robertsons' double wooden gates, old Mrs. Prendergast scrubbing her

> front step, a cobweb glistening in the box hedge, past the Hodges' place, Linda Lovell's overgrown lilac bush and finally grateful to wait at Austin road and hope there was traffic; disappointed when a motorist waved me across, I was perspiring and panting, past the doctor's house, to the sweet-smelling, white flowers of our own privet hedge,

where I kicked open the garden gate, and scooted around the house to the back door.

At times I have a tough uphill climb. I must know where I am going and why I am going there. Someone stronger and wiser than me supplies the wheels of possibility, the sturdy platform to hold my weight, the brake to stop me from getting out of control. Best of all, He will supply a hill for the sheer delight of coasting.

Our society has been flooded with self-help programs. We have told our children that they are "a promise, a great big bundle of potentiality." We are a culture that is filled with platitudes and weak on performance.

Work with people has taught me that there are three core values that must be established if we are to help people achieve their potential. These three values are: obedience, respect and responsibility.

Obedience

At the heart of obedience is a healthy respect for the importance of boundaries and the willingness to submit my will to the authority of another person. I think I can already hear the rebuttal—"If you knew the character of my father, boss, supervisor et al," you would not say that. Rooted in the concept of obedience is the strong believe that I can learn from any person. When I place myself above the authority, I close the door to learning. Rather than trying to understand the intention of the direction, it is challenged with "WHY?" In essence the challenger is saying, "If you can give me a logical reason why I should do this, then I might honor you with the usefulness of my skills."

The ancient Greeks had a word *hupoakoo* which literally means, "listening under." The sense of the word is: "Listening with a view to learning." Obedience is really a posture of humility in which I recognize

there is something I can learn, even in the framework of dysfunctional government. There are some considerations that must be in the mind of the person giving the command:

- 1. Have I clearly communicated my expectations as to: the timeline; the standard of excellence; the consequences of non-compliance; and the line of accountability?
- 2. Have I clearly assessed the ability of the person to fulfill my expectation? Are there skills that need honing; procedures that need reviewing or training that needs implementing?
- 3. Remember, threats create a negative focus that hinders creativity. The

undertone of a threat is really a statement of rejection: "I'm not sure you can do this so I will put my gun to your back to motivate you."

Respect

By dictionary definition respect is: "To have a deferential regard for; esteem; to treat with propriety or consideration."

At the heart of respect is the inherent value of every living person. This is value that is based on who they are as a person not how they perform. As I said in my last article, we must distinguish between the person and their performance. A person may make choices with dreadful consequences but that does not change the value of who they are. The use of

obscenities, crude analogies or defamatory statements, reveals the insecurity of the one who is speaking not the value of the one to whom they are directed.

A ten-year-old boy rammed a pencil through the palm of a fellow class-mate. He was expelled from school and told he could not return until he had a letter of release from a counselor. After the first session it was clear the parents had defined the value of their son based on his negative performance. I had them list all the negative manifestations in their son's behavior. Then we set out to discover the positive quality that was on the flip side of the negative. Rebellion is determination to establish myself as the ultimate authority. Rebellion creates reduction. Determination, as a positive quality, leads to creative solutions to overcome obstacles on our path.

Remember, performance does not define value, it reflects the worldview that has shaped choices. Each person has the right to make wrong choices even if those choices bring hurt to innocent people. Those wrong choices must not give me reason to dishonor or disrespect the person who made them.

Responsibility

In our culture rights has become synonymous with entitlement. "I am entitled to . . . " You can almost finish that statement with anything that is imaginable. Underneath entitlement is the strong driving force, "What's in it for me?"

On the other hand, responsibility says, "What is my part in bringing solution to the problem?" The responsible person doesn't shift the blame to circumstances, the government, the policies or any other convenient hook for getting myself off the hook. The responsible person says I am fully accountable for my own words, actions and attitudes. I take full ownership for what I have said, what I have done and how I have thought.

The person who embraces authority knowing it is a pathway of learning, develops respect knowing that he can be an instrument to separate the gold from the rock and takes full responsibility for the choices he has made, will look with gratitude at the potential that is released through his life.

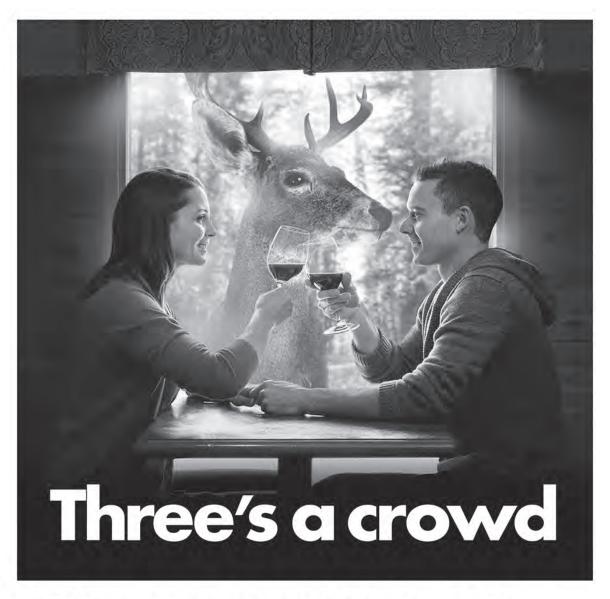
