



# MLA UPDATE · BANFF/KANANSKIS Sarah Elmeligi

# Listening to Banff-Kananaskis

Over the summer, my team and I went door knocking 32 times in 9 different towns/villages/hamlets! We also attended dozens of events from one end of the riding to the other. We have spoken with thousands of you and every conversation has been a gift! Thank you to everyone who opened their door, stopped us on the street, or chatted with us as a market or community event. Every single one of these conversations helps prepare me for heading back to the legislature at the end of this month.

As students went back to school, I started hearing more concerns about Alberta's education system. Parents are worried about overcrowded classrooms, the looming teachers' strike, and the government's controversial book ban. I hear you and I share your concerns.

### The State of Public Education in Alberta

Alberta has the lowest funding per student than any other province in the country. I am dismayed that this truth is not the biggest issue in Education that the government is addressing. This chronic underfunding has led to overcrowded classrooms, stretched resources, and burnt-out staff. Teachers are reporting a lack of support for students with complex needs, and growing frustration with

the conditions they face. Despite rising enrolment and inflation, the government's education budget falls nearly a billion dollars short of what's needed to meet basic needs and bring Alberta up to the Canadian average per student (2020/2021 Statistics Canada). While private school funding is expected to increase over 30% by 2028 (GOA), parents and educators alike are calling for meaningful investment in public schools to ensure every child in Alberta has what they need to thrive. My colleagues and I continue to advocate for adequate funding for public schools and to ensure all students have access to the high-quality education they need to set our province up for success.

# Looming Teachers' Strike

Unless a fair deal can be reached, Alberta is facing a provincewide teachers' strike set to begin on October 6, 2025 - one of the biggest strikes in its history. Hopefully by the time you read this, a resolution will have been found because the reality of over 50,000 teachers walking off the job would significantly impact students and families. The government's September offer was rejected by the Alberta Teachers' Association (ATA), and educators say they've had enough. Teachers are demanding improvements to classroom conditions and a salary that keeps pace with inflation, after years of stagnant wages. Teachers' working conditions are our students' learning conditions, and it's time this government takes urgent action to address both.

### The Book Ban Controversy

Rather than address the real challenges our teachers and students are facing, the government chose to deflect and distract with a book ban. A ministerial order issued earlier this year claimed to target the removal "explicit sexual content" from schools was met with widespread criticism. The initial guideline included books with written descriptions of sexual acts which led to the removal of over 220 titles from school libraries in one district, including many classics and previously required reading materials. We all agree that material in school libraries should be age appropriate, but that is why we have librarians and school boards who use their expertise to review all materials provided. Critics point out the policy lacked transparency and educational input; the policy also disproportionately affects 2SLGBTQ+ and BIPOC authors. My colleagues and I will continue to push the government for funding to hire more librarians, teachers, and educational assistants who can guide students in thoughtful, age-appropriate exploration of literature.

# **Your Voice Matters**

Making your voice heard starts with casting your vote. On October 20, 2025, residents across Banff-Kananaskis will elect municipal leaders who shape decisions on

The Bill enacts a wide range of changes to the Municipal Government Act (MGA), and the Local Authorities Elections Act (LAEA). # **Five Costly Money Mistakes Millennials Make**

# **Campaign Season**

Mark's preoccupied running for Rocky View County Division 1 Councillor, so as his Creative Partner I'm taking over for this month's column. It's a great time to talk about campaign signage and advertising as we'll be seeing it all month long. Number one question ... do lawn signs even work?

The short answer is yes. Election lawn signs have been around for 197 years (since John Quincey Adams and Andrew Jackson were running for President of the United States in 1828). They're a simple and relatively inexpensive way to let the public know who is in the running, a visual insight into what they stand for, and which neighbour endorses them.

Name recognition is the most important factor in elections. At the polls the only thing you see on your ballot is a name, and you don't want *that* to be the first time you see a candidate. You'll see the same names

repeated over and over all month long to cement them into your mind as familiar and credible choices.

The next thing you're going to start seeing are faces of these hopeful candidates and that's on purpose. Faces are 11 times more likely to get attention, with humans programmed to recognize faces twice as fast as any other image (ever looked at a power outlet and thought it looked a little dismayed? That's pareidolia or our hardwired human instinct for shape and facial perception). The social cues and emotions we can convey using faces trumps any inspiring messaging – a picture is worth 1000 words and when whizzing by on your commute you only have time to read 3.

Colours and fonts are used to communicate the values of the candidate – either to connect to greater political party's platform or in the case of municipal non-partisan elections to just show you what kind of personality you're electing. Are they bright and energetic? Mellow and grounded? Do their signs look like they made them themselves rather than approaching their local design experts to help them? This all says something about the candidate and it's up to you to decide if you are liking what they are saying.

Finally, seeing signs on your neighbours' lawns gives personal endorsements for those candidates. If your neighbour's values and yours align, then maybe you will think twice about voting the same way. Conversely, depending on your neighbours, this may also inspire you to immediately seek out the opposition and put up your own sign regardless of how passionate you feel about that candidate. There is also the social aspect of peer pressure, if you're seeing a lot of people putting up signs for one particular candidate you might be more invested into figuring out why everyone thinks they are so great.

At the end of the day however a sign is just a sign - a device to get you curious to do more research and show up at the polls informed and ready to vote.

No matter who you vote for, or what kind of campaign signage they're running, make sure you do your due diligence on the happenings in your area and make up your opinions on how you want to be heard and represented. The most important part is always showing up.

# AGE-RELATED SHOULDER HEALTH

Shoulder pain is one of the most common musculoskeletal complaints in adults, especially as we age. While many cases are linked to the rotator cuff – a group of four muscles and tendons that stabilize and move the shoulder – pain can also be referred from the neck, particularly from cervical nerve roots at levels C5 and C6. Understanding the interplay between local tissue strain, age-related changes, and nerve-related pain patterns is essential for accurate diagnosis, effective treatment, and long-term prevention.

The rotator cuff includes the supraspinatus, infraspinatus, teres minor, and subscapularis muscles. These structures are prone to injury because they are small, work constantly to stabilize the shoulder, and are subject to high mechanical demand. Some mechanisms that can strain the shoulder muscles are overhead activities, repetitive motions, lifting with poor mechanics, and sudden force that may overstretch or tear the tendons. Some symptoms to be aware of include pain with lifting the arm, weakness in rotation or elevation, night pain (especially when lying on the affected side), and limited shoulder mobility.

In the neck, the C5 and C6 nerve roots are responsible for innervating (providing nutrition to) the shoulder and upper arm.

Compression or irritation of these nerves – due to disc degeneration, herniation, or narrowing of the cervical foramina (tunnels the nerve runs through) – can mimic or coexist with rotator cuff pathology. Common patterns include:

- C5 neuropathy: May cause pain over the lateral shoulder, weakness in deltoid and supraspinatus, and altered sensation in the shoulder region.
- C6 neuropathy: Often presents with pain radiating down the arm toward the thumb, weakness in biceps and wrist extensors, and sensory changes along the radial forearm.
- Referred pain patterns: Unlike rotator cuff strain, cervical radiculopathy may cause burning, tingling, or numbness in addition to weakness.

Age related changes and shoulder health naturally evolve over time. There may be tendon degeneration due to changes in tissue elasticity, decreased collagen and vascular supply. Chronic muscle tears and disuse can lead to muscle atrophy (weakness). In the neck, cervical spine degeneration with disc height loss, osteophytes, and joint narrowing at C5–C6 are common after age 40, increasing risk of nerve compression. Often there is an overlap of all these scenarios as many patients over 50 have both degenerative cuff changes and cervical spine findings, which can complicate diagnosis.

Despite how this sounds, there is hope! Though age-related changes cannot be fully avoided, proactive strategies reduce risk and preserve function. It is important

to maintain your strength and mobility. Working on the rotator cuff muscles and scapular stabilizers must be incorporated into your strengthening program. Mobility - postural exercises, chest stretches, and upper back flexibility are important to incorporate. The shoulder joint is excellent at compensating for tightness in other areas, as it is a joint with nearly 360 degrees of range. Thus, it gets easily over-used when adjacent joints and muscles in the upper body are inflexible. Some preventative measures may include proper ergonomics, adjusting a workstation height and screen position to reduce neck flexion, avoiding repetitive overhead strain, and using proper lifting mechanics.

Rotator cuff strains and cervical C5–C6 neuropathies often present with similar pain patterns, especially in older adults where degenerative changes are common. Prevention through strength, posture, and mobility work remains key. When pain arises, accurate assessment to distinguish shoulder versus cervical causes allows for targeted rehabilitation, reducing risk of chronic pain and preserving independence. Early intervention will help you get back to the activities you love, sleeping better and putting you at ease.



# Bragg Creek Wild Meets Rocky View County Leadership

Despite a summer dominated by heavy rains and flooding challenges, Rocky View County's top leadership made time to meet with Bragg Creek Wild (BCW). On the agenda: strengthening partnerships and moving closer to addressing key issues in the coming year.

Joining the discussion were Reegan McCullough (Chief Administrative Officer), Byron Rieman (Chief Operating Officer), Mason Austen (Manager of Utility Services), and our Councillor Kevin Hanson. Bragg Creek Wild was represented by Lucy Curtis and Renée Delorme.



The conversation was engaging and forward-looking, reflecting the community's deep commitment to safeguarding Bragg Creek's natural environment while navigating increasing pressures from tourism and growth.

# Protecting What Makes Bragg Creek Special

At the heart of the discussion was the need for land use policies that preserve the unique character and ecological health of Bragg Creek. With rising visitation and early signs of overtourism, BCW emphasized the importance of balancing community needs with environmental stewardship. The group highlighted the community's recent Area Structure Plan vision for Regenerative Living and Regenerative Tourism. This philosophy recognizes that healthy functioning ecosystems are essential if we want both residents and visitors to thrive. Maintaining healthy functioning ecosystems first starts with adapted land use policies. It also includes measures that, while seemingly mundane, profoundly impact our wildlife and their habitats.

# Current concerns Bragg Creek Wild is focusing on include:

- Wildlife pathways in the flood berm: Since 2022, BCW has been working to retrofit the hamlet's berm with three safe wildlife access points to the river.
- Garbage management: Since 2023, efforts have been underway to establish a refuse bylaw to reduce human-wildlife conflicts.
- Wildlife safety signage: With the support of RVC Transportation Services, signage has been installed to remind motorists to drive safely and protect wildlife along county roads. These efforts must now expand to our provincial roads (White Avenue and Hwy 8, 22, 22X and 66). All these roads experience a high incidence of wildlife-vehicle collisions.

### From Ideas to Action

While BCW's initiatives have enjoyed strong support, the challenges of staff turnover and complex bureaucracy have slowed progress. The meeting was an opportunity to request advice and assistance from the County to ensure these projects reach fruition. Encouragingly, several concrete next steps emerged:

- Garbage Bylaw: The County will investigate the current status and explore options for moving it forward including educational activities, and strategies to support commercial and residential areas while the bylaws process carries through.
- Flood Berm Modifications: Costs and approval processes for new wildlife access points will be confirmed, with a view to possible inclusion in the 2026 budget. The hope is that these access points will reduce the incidence of broken legs in our deer population and facilitate their movement through this wildlife corridor.
- Wildlife Signage: Opportunities for expanded signage or other strategies on County and Provincial infrastructure will be explored to further reduce wildlife encounters.

# **Looking Ahead**

The meeting ended on a positive note, with a shared commitment to ongoing collaboration. Bragg Creek Wild expressed particular gratitude to Councillor Kevin Hanson for his steadfast support, deep knowledge of County programs, and invaluable guidance over the past four years. With fresh leadership at the County level and renewed momentum, Bragg Creek Wild is optimistic that these longstanding community priorities will finally move closer to reality in the coming year.

In addition to Alberta Cup races, Club Racer Athletes can compete in other Regional or National level Ski Races throughout the ski season in conversation with coaches and with 3rd party support coordinated by XCBC. Prerequisites: Capable skiers, able to perform both, classic and skating ski techniques on challenging trails. Maturity to listen to and follow coach instructions and ask questions when appropriate without disrupting the session or interfering with the learning and training of other athletes, General: Registrants are all subject to

evaluation, participation in the Club Racer program is at all times subject to Coach discretion based on athlete ability to meet the demands of the program. New skiers looking for beginner level coaching and instruction to learn to ski will be directed to the Recreational Ski Program. # **Trail Talk**

# Popular Trail in West Bragg Creek Decommissioned

Regular trail users in West Bragg Creek will be familiar with the boulder-hop across Bragg Creek to access Old Shell Road and likely have risked a "soaker" or two. This shortcut to the north trails is now permanently closed and is being restored to its natural state. Restoration work has also been completed to protect the eroded creek banks that were heavily damaged by past flooding. Closing this crossing is an important step to reduce impacts on the fragile Bragg Creek aquatic environment, which is designated as critical bull trout habitat. The restoration plan also includes strategic plantings and debris piles to hinder access. Shell Oil and its contractors, under a mandate from Alberta's Energy Regulator, are completing this work

before Shell can relinquish its Licence of Occupation.

Bypass routes remain available along the south side of the creek, leading to the Moose Connector bridge for crossing. Once approved, BCT plans to twin Braggin' Rights trail with a new section connecting to the top end of Old Shell Road for access to Moose Connector and beyond. For this winter, the trail management plan will accommodate displaced fat bikers, snowshoers, and walkers by packing an exclusive trail along the east edge of the Moose Connector ski trail. This short section, between Moose Meadow and the creek bridge, will be marked with poles and designed to keep all users safely in their lanes.

BCT thanks everyone for their cooperation in respecting the posted signage. Doing so will ensure your trail experience remains positive, safe and environmentally responsible.



# Rocky View County Division 1



1. What is a success or something to celebrate within your division or County that you as a councillor would like to build upon?

# **KEVIN HANSON**

Completing the Springbank Area Structure Plan and ensuring policy is imbedded for access to the Elbow River, alongside environmental protection. Working with STAPA and championing a non-statutory public hearing be convened to discuss Range Rd 31's potential road allowance closure.

Guiding the new EVRC staff organization in setting up close working relationships with County Staff. Advocating for Active Transportation Network (pathway) connectivity between Highway 8 communities, Springbank and Calgary. Attending many areas' Home Owner Association AGMs for updates and Q&A.

Requesting a re-think of the whole Bragg Creek Area Structure Plan, not just expansion lands. Advocating for a Visioning Committee as a new first step of our ASP process to help build stakeholder consensus. Working closely with local groups to build a more unified community voice with Council and Administration. Firesmart Committee reboot.

# MARK KAMACHI

Continued collaboration and communication between Rocky View County, Calgary and the Government of Alberta for transportation and road projects in Elbow Valley and Bragg Creek which have improved transportation for our community.

I would focus on building the relationship between Rocky View County (RVC) and the Tsuut'ina Nation, which benefits each community. With Tsuut'ina Nation's spanning the entirety of Division 1 south of Highway 8 and bordering Bragg Creek to the east, it makes sense to develop strong and respectful relations.

Next, establishing an emergency egress/access route along with continuing

FireSmart initiatives would ensure residents of Bragg Creek and area have a secure and efficient way to evacuate or access essential services in times of emergency.

Streamlining development processes locally and throughout RVC for homeowners and developers is key. Supporting reasonable and sensible development that focus on providing options for seniors to stay in their community and for young families or potential workers for local businesses to be able to live here is important for a healthy community in Division 1.

2. What are the top concerns you hear from residents in your division? Of these concerns, what do you see as the top 2 priorities you would represent?

# **KEVIN HANSON**

Division 1 is very diverse. It includes a Growth Hamlet, traditional Country Residential, newer Cluster Developments, mixed Ranching/Farming. Priorities for each area vary widely. Concerns include: Highway 8 construction. Fire Protection via hydrants. Wildland fire risk. Secondary Egress for West-Bragg, Gateway development delays, Bragg Creek ASP completion, Wildlife protections, Environmental Asset Protection, River Access, Hamlet Infrastructure challenges, Tourism challenges, Solid Waste and Garbage, County Service Levels. My priorities are closely aligned with setting priority for local needs and wants. It is a balancing act and focusing on only 2 priorities will allow too many balls to drop for too many other residents of Division 1. That said, a single top priority is advocating Division 1 amongst my Colleagues on the newly elected Council, and continue to build a strong reputation for our diverse communities.

# MARK KAMACHI

One of the top concerns is about the need for an emergency egress/access route in the Bragg Creek area should we ever have a wildfire. This is not a matter of "when" but of "how" as we have seen wildfires in neighbouring Alberta communities. Wildfire mitigation is crucial as it directly impacts the safety and security of our homes and natural environment throughout all of RVC.

Next, there is a strong call to make the development process more efficient for homeowners and businesses, which would facilitate local growth and economic contribution. There isn't a week that goes by where a local resident or business owner doesn't mention how dealing with RVC is an exercise in frustration. Our negative reputation around sensible development continues to limit RVC and this must be addressed.

My top two priorities to focus on for Division 1 would be fire mitigation in conjunction with developing an emergency escape route should we encounter a wildfire situation in the Bragg Creek area. None now exists, and since our neighbours, Tsuut'ina Nation and Foothills County, share the same threat, this critical piece of infrastructure is essential to each community. Be it a road, secondary bridge access, or combination of the two, providing a safe escape is essential for all residents and visitors, while providing firefighters effective access to fight the fire. One bridge as it stands cannot do both.

Also, development process for both residents and commercial business investors alike needs to be further streamlined for efficiency. Whether it be to build a tourist destination, a recreational facility, school, river crossing/pathway, or to add a deck or build a cottage home, sensible development benefits all. Having a streamlined, transparent process lets us move forward and keep up to the demands of locals, those who visit, and potentially those who want to make RVC their home.

3. If you're not elected, how will you continue to advocate for your community and division?

# **KEVIN HANSON**

If I am not re-elected, I will seek out County and community committee and board leadership opportunities that are at a more boots-on-the-ground level compared to the over-arching governance role being a Councillor entails. Having grown up hiking and scrambling in the mountains west of Calgary I have always had Bragg Creek in my backyard. This past 4 years I have very much enjoyed helping Bragg Creek continue to recover from the flooding, and set a new course - with one eye on the past and one eye on the future with its new ASP underway. Despite a bit of distance, I would look for volunteer opportunities in the community since I know and understand it better now than before this term on Council.

# Rocky View County Division 2

1. What is a success or something to celebrate within your division or County that you as a councillor would like to build upon?

# **BEV COPITHORNE**

I'd like to build on the recreation in Springbank. While the current council recognized the need for more recreation facilities, I am not convinced that the choices address the true needs of our community. Since this approval is conditional, I would like to ensure that what actually goes forward is what is best for the community. The last time broadbased, meaningful engagement happened was in 2017 and it is imperative that the County update this before moving forward. A new community center is overdue, but the major questions I have is the need to build two separate facilities and the long term costs of both of those facilities. It is not fiscally responsible to approve spending \$26 million on two separate facilities before ensuring that these accurately reflect our community's recreation needs.

# **DON KOCHAN**

- Updated Springbank Area Structure Plan to support rural lifestyle, parcels no less than 2 acres.
- Design initiation of the Springbank Community Event Centre and addition of a recreational facility at SPFAS.
- Updated the Agricultural Master Plan to recognize the need to preserve agricultural lands for farming and ranching.
- Established an Aggregate Resource Plan that provides for better performance standards and monitoring of onsite operations.
- Approved a zero percent municipal tax increase over the last couple of years while maintaining or enhancing county services.

2. What are the top concerns you hear from residents in your division? Of these concerns, what do you see as the top 2 priorities you would represent?

# **BEV COPITHORNE**

Most residents are concerned about development and ensuring that it doesn't negatively impact our local rural communities. They also want to ensure tax dollars are spent responsibly and more specifically on recreation. They are expressing frustration about how the county addresses fire services given the rural nature of our communities, dealing with traffic congestion and safety, and how we protect agricultural land and operations. While I'm committed to addressing all of these, my top two priorities are ensuring sustainable development and fiscal responsibility. Development must support its own growth and cover the costs of the systems it puts pressures on whether that's roads or water and wastewater handling.

- 1. Pressures of growth and how it is managed.
- 2. Need for a sustainable approach to public utilities, including how water systems are supported.
- 3. Need for more community event space, regional pathways and interchange updates.

Top Two Priorities

Growth. Ensure development advances in a logical manner while protecting the rural lifestyle. Ensure proper infrastructure (utilities, transportation, etc.) is in place as development occurs.

Community. Collaborate with our surrounding municipalities to ensure RVC's growth standards are met. Develop a utility business model so we have the expertise to run the present public systems and allow for incorporating water coops that no longer wish to take on that huge responsibility. Update the recreation master plan and deliver the Springbank Community Event Centre and SPFAS expansion.





# ARE SCHOOL BOARD ELECTIONS AS MUCH FUN AS A HOCKEY GAME? By John Hilton-O'Brien

There's an old joke: I went to a fight – and a hockey game broke out.

Anyone who's signed their kids up for hockey has heard it. What matters is that we trust the people setting the rules to keep the league from turning into a street brawl with skates. And if they don't, every parent knows those people can be fired.

Public schools, though? A little murkier. They're sprawling institutions, with administrators, policies, and jargon thick enough to choke a bureaucrat. Parents often feel powerless in the face of all that. But here's the secret: we do control who sets the rules.

Those people are called trustees. And on October 20th, you get to choose who your local trustee is.

Here's the crazy part: hardly anyone bothers to vote in these elections. Turnout limps along at 25% or less. Most people can't name their trustee, let alone the candidates. It's like complaining about the refs when you skipped the game entirely. Worse – when you skip, they get to rewrite the whole rulebook – and they might want to play a different game than you do.

Part of the confusion comes from what trustees don't do. They don't pick your child's teacher. They don't hire and fire staff. They don't write the provincial curriculum. So, what's left?

The answer: the rules of the game.

Superintendents are the monarchs of dayto-day operations. They decide staffing, resources, and implementation. But trustees hire or fire that Superintendent, set the budget, and decide on the division's governing policies.

It's all important. Monitoring budget compliance is vital. Reserve funds can be spent in questionable ways. Money meant for teachers can get spent on administrator's pet projects instead. And a poor choice of Superintendent can make everyone's lives miserable. But policy – that's the rules of the game.

Want an anti-bullying policy? Trustees. A Christian program in your school? Trustees. A process for challenging library books? Trustees again. The Superintendent just carries out whatever framework trustees put in place.

Take the Alberta government's recent order on school libraries: explicit sexual images are out, catalogues must be public, and parents must have a process to challenge books. But the government didn't say what that process looks like. That's up to trustees. Do they only deal with images? What about text — say, Fifty Shades of Grey in a Grade 7 library? If trustees don't set reasonable rules, families leave, and the funding leaves with them. On the other hand, nobody wants to waste teaching time in endless book battles or see classics tossed out in moral panics. The balance —

respect concerns without wrecking classrooms — comes down to trustees.

This year, more than ever, the people who set those rules matter.

Some people shrug: "I don't have kids in school." Irrelevant. You still live with the results. When schools fail, the products of that failure show up in courtrooms and police blotters. Or worse — they decide that political assassination is a legitimate career option. That's not exactly the civics lesson we're aiming for.

And let's be practical. One day, you and I will be in a nursing home. The quality of that care will depend on the education of the people running it. At that point, whether your trustee in 2025 thought parents mattered will suddenly feel very personal.

So, interview the candidates. Ask if they've ever hired people, managed a budget, or — heaven forbid — listened to parents. Use the book challenge as a test: do they have a plan that balances sanity with respect? And if no candidate measures up, run yourself. Nominations close on the 22nd.

One last thing: with turnout this low, your ballot in a trustee election counts for more than at almost any other level. Think of it as democracy on clearance sale – 75% off today. It's a good deal.

So on October 20th, go vote. Don't let the real fight break out after the school game ends.

## Should I Get a Dashcam?

I have been wondering for a couple of years now whether or not to buy a dashcam. Consequently, I have been doing some research on the reasons for and against. The latest statistics I can find are from 2021 which show that about 11% of Canadians use dashcams. The projections are that the market is expanding significantly so that number is undoubtedly higher today. I asked my insurance representative what his thoughts were, and his guess was that it was north of 20%.

The largest user of dashcams according to Madeinca.ca website are trucking companies. It states 63% of trucking companies have installed dashcams to monitor driver behaviour. An interesting result of this is that, correspondingly, 58% of trucking companies have seen a reduction in accidents following the installation of dashcams.

But I am not a trucking company. It has been reported that 35% of Canadians install dashcams to protect themselves from fraud. You may have seen videos (from a dashcam) where people have thrown themselves in front of a vehicle pretending to have been hit with the intention of wanting to collect on insurance or blackmailing the driver to pay up.

What is a dashcam exactly? <u>Madeinca.ca</u> says "Dashcams are small cameras that are mounted on the dashboard or windshield of a car, facing either forward or backward. They are used to record video footage of the road in front or behind the car. The footage can be used for a range of purposes such as insurance claims, legal disputes, or as evidence in the event of an accident.

Dashcams record video onto a memory card or cloud storage. They often use loop recording, meaning that when the memory card is full, the new footage will be recorded over the old footage. Some even have motion detection that will automatically trigger the camera to record if it senses movement or impact."

People install dashcams to provide an "impartial, reliable witness" as to what actually occurred. It appears the general motivation behind installing dashcams is



that they offer a sense of security and proof-of-fault in an accident. I have seen advice that if you have dashcam footage, don't tell the other driver you have it. Doing so will give them time to change their story to fit what the camera has recorded.

A second stated reason for individuals to install a dashcam is to record road trip memories. That may be applicable for some people but not for me. But it may be important for you.

A third reason, and probably one of the most important reasons for me, is to have a record of what is happening to my vehicle when it is parked. Whether that be at a shopping centre or at a trailhead. Who is hitting me in the parking lot, or who is breaking into or vandalizing by vehicle when I'm on a hike or a backpacking trip.

While not a buying motivation for me, I've noticed that in accident situations or other criminal activities, police are increasingly asking the public if anyone has dashcam footage relating to the incident.

What are the logistics of actually buying and installing a dashcam? Dashcams are a semi-expensive option for peace of mind. They can run you anywhere from under a hundred dollars to over \$600.

The Kelly Blue Book website gives some advice on what features to consider:

1) Resolution – nothing less than HD 1080pixels, 2) 30 frames per second is a good baseline, 3) a Field of View of 150 degrees, 4) night vision capability, 5) SD card capacity – the higher the better but be sure your dashcam can accommodate the capacity of your SD card, 5) Looping – the ability to record over previous footage when the capacity of the SD card has been reached, 6) Parked monitor – records vandalism, burglary, or a crash when parked and the engine is off.

Another feature to consider is how many channels does your dashcam monitor?

Does it just provide forward footage or can it also provide rear, side or interior footage? For me, I would think rear footage would be valuable.

Does the installation of a dashcam lower your insurance costs? While some sources say yes, most say no, and my insurance agent confirms they do not offer a discount if you have a dashcam installed. Having said that, it will most likely help settle "who's at fault" disputes quicker and will help protect you from fraudulent claims of various sorts.

So, am I going to ask for a dashcam for Christmas? I very well may

## SHEEP RIVER LIBRARY

enhances me or will it make my life more productive?





We had several players from our area on the Zone 3, Calgary Slo-Pitch teams; Gold medals were won by Gary Paukert, Curtis Buck, and Randy Irwin, and Jack Bews' team won Bronze. Rounding out the team in Floor Curling we had Marjorie Black, Marion Doell, Pat Shaul and Marion Patrick; in Golf Jean Whyte; and in Pickleball, Serena Goutbeck and Carol Breen.

From Rockyview County, of the 37 athletes competing, 4 from Bragg Creek: Lee and Linda Edwards - 4th in Duplicate Bridge, Colin Gilbert - Gold in Men's Pickleball; and Clint Docken - 2 Golds in Recreational Cycling. From Bearspaw, Ralph Hindle, Bearspaw, won 2 Golds in Competitive Cycling; Lynda Gross, 2 Silver and a Bronze in Track, and Brian Hill, Springbank, 3 Gold and 1 Silver. Cochrane medalists included Blossom Braganza, a Silver and Bronze in Darts; Doug Campbell, Silver in Floor Shuffleboard, Kim Dumanowski, Silver, and Chris Logan, Bronze, in Golf; in Pickleball, Vladi Hudec, Kim Pearson, Doug Gillman, Steve Katulka, Gary Hawkes, & Greg Braganza all medaled. Our Zone 70+ Mens Slopitch

team earned Bronze for Pat Drinnan, Dan Muhlbach, and Reg MacDonald. Swimmer Joan Gunn-Allard continued her dominance in the pool with 4 Golds. Lyndon Emro won 2 Gold and 1 Silver in Track.

In Culture, Linda Edwards earned a Silver in acrylic painting, Myrna Fink a Gold and 2 Silver in Photography, and Tracy Hindle a Gold in Woodworking and a Bronze in Photography.

In total there were over 1100 participants from all over the province. Normally, provincial games lead to Canada Games, but unfortunately there are no Canada 55 Plus games in 2026. Next year we will focus on Fun Games throughout the zone and will open them to non-members. Fort MacMurray will be hosting the Alberta 55 Plus Provincial Games in August, 2027, and Grande Prairie will be home to the Winter Games in 2027/28, leading to Canada 55 Plus Games in 2028. ## INCORPORATING by Bill Stemp

When you incorporate in Alberta, you are able to limit your liability to creditors. What this means is you will not be personally responsible for the debts of the corporation because the corporation is deemed by law to be a separate legal entity. You will only be responsible for corporate debts if you sign a personal guarantee for instance with a bank. This is very important for you to understand.

When you incorporate you must have at least one shareholder and one director. The directors of a company are the people who are responsible for the corporation's activities. The directors hire or appoint the officers who in a small corporation are usually the same people. The shareholders elect the directors annually. The corporations that we set up have 6 classes of shares, one class of voting common shares, 4 classes of nonvoting common shares and one class of preferred shares. We do this so that you can have investors

in your corporation who would not necessarily want or need to have any say as to who the directors of the company would be but they would like to have dividends paid to them for their investment. By having different classes of nonvoting shares, you can have different dividend rates paid to these shareholders. For example, one class of nonvoting shares could have a fixed dividend rate of 4% per year while another class could have a fixed dividend rate of 6% per year.

Further, the directors can decide if the dividends are to be paid every year or only if the corporation has sufficient profit to declare a dividend. The directors also can determine the dividend rate to be paid each year. This gives the directors much more flexibility to handle the corporation's affairs.

By incorporating you are able to have a health benefit trust set up where your personal medical expenses can be reimbursed to you by the corporation without this being deemed to be taxable to you as the employee. Further, the corporation is entitled to write off these expenses from its taxable income. So you as the shareholder/employee do not pay tax on the money reimbursed to you by the


corporation and the corporation is entitled to write off this cost. This can be a very big benefit to you.

If your Corporation qualifies as what is known as a Canadian Controlled Private Corporation, which usually applies to anyone with active business income, the applicable corporate income tax rate is 9% Federal and 2% for Alberta. However please note that for inactive business income which includes investment income i.e., interest, the rate is 38% Federal and 8% Alberta.

Thus in most cases you will be paying a total of 11% Federal and Provincial for corporate income tax which is substantially less than what you would be paying as an unincorporated business.

The cost to incorporate is \$1,200 plus GST plus disbursement costs of approximately \$475. These fees includes a name search, incorporating, minute book, share certificates and minutes/resolutions to set up the directors/shareholders.

## MORTGAGE MATTERS by Candace Perko

## 8 in 10 Canadians Say Mortgage Fraud Creates an Unfair Housing Market

A new national poll conducted by Pollara Strategic Insights on behalf of Mortgage Professionals Canada (MPC) and The Mortgage and Title Insurance Industry Association of Canada (MTIIAC) finds that Canadians see mortgage fraud as a serious problem that drives up housing costs, and strongly support giving lenders and brokers the ability to verify income with the Canada Revenue Agency (CRA).

The survey of more than 2,000 adults found:

- 78% agree mortgage fraud creates an unfair playing field for honest buyers, while 64% believe it drives up housing prices.
- 58% of Canadians overall are concerned about mortgage fraud, with concern rising to 65% among those planning to buy within the next five years.
- Nearly two-thirds (65%) of Canadians believe the CRA should have a role in preventing mortgage fraud.

 72% support allowing lenders and mortgage brokers to confirm income information directly with the CRA, a view shared across political lines.

"These findings confirm what mortgage professionals see on the ground every day — Canadians want a fairer, more transparent system that protects honest homebuyers," said Lauren van den Berg, President and CEO of Mortgage Professionals Canada. "Mortgage fraud not only undermines trust, it drives up housing costs for everyone. Income verification through the CRA is a practical solution that will strengthen trust in the housing market and help ensure everyone plays by the same rules. As an industry, we are committed to working with the government to give Canadians the confidence that their mortgage process is secure and equitable."

#### Background

The findings of this poll build on ongoing federal discussions about strengthening Canada's housing ecosystem.

Over the past two years, the government and the CRA have explored ways to introduce a secure digital income verification tool, with strong support from the mortgage industry and consumer groups.

Federal Momentum on CRA Income Verification Tool Budget 2024 included the federal government's commitment to consult with the mortgage industry on developing an income verification tool via the CRA to address mortgage fraud. MPC welcomed this announcement, noting that for every \$1 lost to fraud it takes \$4 for lenders to recoup, and expressed confidence in collaborative solutions benefiting homebuyers.

In fall 2024, the CRA conducted nationwide consultations, including roundtable discussions and an online questionnaire, to gather input from mortgage industry professionals on designing a secure, digital tool to verify borrower income and reduce documentation-based fraud.

In late 2024, the Fall Economic Statement indicated "the CRA aims to begin implementation of this measure in early 2025" in reference to "a new tool to combat mortgage fraud". In July 2025, the CRA released findings confirming strong industry support for a real-time, secure digital tool (either via portal or API), allowing income validation with borrower consent. Participants emphasized benefits like streamlined approvals and fraud reduction.

However, despite the pledge in the Fall Economic Statement to begin implementation in early 2025, progress has stalled. Canadians deserve a secure and fair housing market. An income verification tool is a practical, low-cost solution that fights fraud, protects honest buyers, and supports housing affordability.

# PREHISTORIC VISITORS IN FALL MIGRATION by Laura Griffin

October is a time to appreciate all the fall colours both on the leaves of our trees and in the migrant birds who are passing through our neighbourhoods. One of our biggest migrants that uses the Boreal Forest, Foothills and Prairies for an occasional breeding ground is the immense and prehistoric Sandhill Crane. I have yet to have the pleasure of finding one of these birds in the wild, but our dear editor Lowell ran into a breeding pair this summer.

I call it prehistoric for a few reasons. One is the first known Sandhill Crane showed up in the fossil record in Florida 2.5 million years ago, making it the oldest known living bird species. Another is that as someone who works as a prehistoric guide these massive birds look like some of their ancient dinosaur relatives very well might have. They are over a meter tall with wing spans longer than most humans are tall at 6.5 feet. They have a bald red spot above a long bill which is used to eat everything in their omnivore diet from berries, seeds, and invertebrates to small mammals and snakes. Sandhill Cranes have grey plumage as adults; however, they partake in something known as staining. This is where they rub mud into their feathers. When the mud is rich in iron, this action stains their feathers to a rusty brown colour. This can lead to some confusion when trying to identify the crane. The last reason is their call. I encourage you to play a Sandhill Crane call in a dark room and see if you don't imagine yourself in a prehistoric rainforest. It's a rapid call that's part trill and part bugle.

When you come across a Sandhill Crane it is likely you will find at least two together as they mate for life and spend the entire year together. They travel from Mexico and the Southern United States up into Canada and as far as Alaska using the Central Flyway, a migration corridor that narrows around Nebraska. This impressive journey, which can be over 8000 kilometers, is done riding thermals during the day to save as much energy as possible. At night they rest literally sleeping with one eye open while the other eye and half of their brain go into a deep sleep.

If they make it through this incredible journey the pair renew their bond with calling to one another and elaborate dances showing off their wings and jumping ability. The pair will then lay two eggs and if they are lucky one chick



will survive long enough to travel back south with them. Although it is not all luck, Sandhill Cranes have been known to chase off alligators (in Florida) and other predators who they think are getting too close to their family.

If you would like to help the migrating birds, please turn off your lights from 11pm to 6am for the nocturnal migrators like songbirds, and give the diurnal migrators a respectful viewing distance to help them save their energy reserves.



## ADHD AND BIPOLAR DISORDER

## WHAT IS BIPOLAR?

Bipolar Mood Disorder (BMD) is a mood disorder where a person experiences intense feelings of happiness or sadness, high energy ('mania') or low energy ('depression'). These mood shifts can happen over a period of days to weeks to months. It would seem as if the person's mood has taken on a life of its own.

#### WHAT IS THE CONNECTION?

Attention Deficit Hyperactivity Disorder (ADHD) and BMD share similar behaviour symptoms i.e. moodiness, restlessness, poor concentration and impatience. As such, there is increased risk of a misdiagnosis or a missed diagnosis. Both conditions involve strong emotions. People with ADHD can easily feel overwhelmed and know what triggered their reaction, while people with BMD go through 'rollercoaster' mood changes without a specific external event. Both involve impulsivity.

People with ADHD can jump into things with little planning, while those with BMD are often hyper-sexual, make poor and impulsive decisions i.e. buy things they can't afford or make sudden travel plans. People with ADHD can suddenly 'snap' or 'crash', while mood shifts in those with BMD build up over time and are diagnosed through the specific duration of their mood episodes. For people with BMD, other symptoms of 'mania' also include excessive talking, a decreased need for sleep or food, and racing thoughts. Some people can feel euphoric and really productive for a while.

## ARE YOU BORN WITH IT?

Both ADHD and BMD run in families however, those with BMD are likely to have fewer genetic connections. ADHD occurs before age 12 with pervasive symptoms, while the age of onset for BMD is during adolescence into early adulthood with episodic behaviours. Childhood BMD can occur, but is very rare (and difficult to diagnose).

## ADHD AND BMD TREATMENT

Both conditions can co-exist. Treatments work differently for different people. It may include medication, therapy and a biopsychosocial plan. You have to find the right combination. Many practitioners treat the BMD first (therapy and anti-depressants; usually mood stabilizers or anti-psychotics work well and quickly for manic symptoms), as initial ADHD treatment can precipitate mania or even worsen BMD. Alternatively, if stimulant

medication treats the ADHD effectively, then there may be improvement seen in the person's lack of impulse control. No doubt, ADHD and a mood disorder can make life very difficult. Appropriate treatment can help to minimize the symptoms, provide longer periods of stability and greatly improve a person's quality of life.

#### WHAT ARE SOME SELF-HELP TIPS?

- Stick to a routine. Train your brain through consistent waking times, eating habits, work schedule and sleep hygiene.
- Carve out play time. It heals part of the brain where therapy and other cognitive strategies can't get to.
- Laughter. It is suggested that laughter therapy can reverse the stress response, alter dopamine and serotonin levels and facilitate healing.

- Sweat exercise. Decreases cortisol and increases endorphins. Less depression, better memory and quick learning.
- Mood journal. Use it like your GPS to tell where you've been and where you're headed based on biodata like hours of sleep, stressors, trigger foods and day of menstrual cycle. It allows you to see basic patterns of health and illness, so you can head in the right direction.
- Eat brain foods. Fruit, vegetables, fish, nuts, yogurt, seeds and aaah, yes dark chocolate!
